

# Working Puzzles

To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good.

1 Cor. 12:7

When I was growing up, if the doors of the church were open, I was there. I knew every nook and cranny of the building. I knew how the office

staff made things work and happen. I knew that it is terribly inappropriate to climb up into the organ pipe room behind the front wall of the sanctuary and 'play' with the organ pipes. I was introduced, very early, to how a large church operates from the business end of things to the spiritual end.

In late high school, there was some major misconduct in my church among the clergy and related to the youth. It caused such a large ripple in the water – one of incredible hurt and distrust. For more than a decade, now, the church has worked to heal and rebuild its faith in one another and in what God has for them. But in witnessing it all as a youth, I was made aware of an alternative spiritual gift that I have – one of awareness and evaluation.

Even as a young person, I could see where something was wrong – whether it was in systems we've built or something more like an injustice. I was also strategic. Why can't we do A instead of B? That might make this (whatever this was) better.

And so, of course, I became a pastor – not because of my eloquent use of words or my amazing intellect in teaching. I became a pastor

- 1. because it is my calling and
- 2. because I can see what's wrong, what's broken, or what isn't working and strategize to make it better.

That's my gift. If the others are true as well, well, that's just a bit of an extra blessing. Isn't it?

Sunday I preached on the gifts of the Spirit and how not one is greater to God than another but how necessary and important it is for each gift – given by God – to be used for the good of the community (both faith community and greater community). I spoke about how every gift is a puzzle piece and how disappointing it is to get through with a 10,000 piece puzzle and come up one piece short. We need all of the pieces. We need **your** piece.



- 5. Can you hide Easter eggs, or cook breakfast, or paint faces? We need your piece for our annual Breakfast with the Easter Bunny, Saturday, April 13th from 9:00 11:00.

## Sharing our blessings

Sometimes you want to hoard all the money you have for that rainy day you know is coming. I do this, because I was taught to save and prepare. I even do this with the donations we receive for the Trinity Room in the Inn ministry. Trinity members and neighbors give donations, and I think, "We shouldn't spend too much of that, because we will need it for more supplies soon or some unknown emergency."

I spend a lot of money on RITI supplies: men's boxer shorts, women's underwear, T-shirts, bras, travel-sized antiperspirant and Gold Bond powder, toboggan hats, gloves, rain ponchos, tissue packs, and much more. It really adds up. I had been so busy last year that I did not turn in my receipts for reimbursement for many months. When I finally added it all up, it was almost \$2,000. I thought, "This is going to wipe us out." It didn't, but it left us with less than \$1,000. Rosemary and I still believed we would get more donations in the coming months that would help us through the end of the season.

My only regret was that we would not be able to help the city-wide program with an annual donation. For the past few years, we have helped support Room in the Inn-Memphis by giving a large gift of \$500 to \$1,000 each winter season. Without the city-wide program, Trinity would not be able to continue our RITI ministry. The program has grown so large in Memphis that they now need a few meagerly-paid staff members. They work tirelessly almost every day to make sure the program works perfectly, and our guests get screened and sent to the right churches each night. They also provide social work-type services, helping our guests get connected to the resources they need.

Within a day of me worrying about us not giving a donation, our Trinity RITI ministry received an unexpected \$1,000 gift from an Evergreen neighbor. Was this a coincidence? I don't know. Of course, my first thought was to keep it for our own needs, but then Rosemary and I talked about it and decided we should share it with RITI-Memphis.
