

# The God Who is Seen

I'm a visual learner. Or, well, I'm a visual learner but also a hands-on learner. I have to see it or do it to understand it. This is why, at 33 years old, I cannot tell you that I could successfully change a tire if I had to. It's not because I haven't been taught

(several times). It's because I've more-or-less been told how to do it and have never seen it done or done it myself. I have to see it to know it.

I'll admit that I struggle with God sometimes for these same reasons. I want to see God. I want to put my hands-on God. I find myself envying the earliest of disciples who were privy to the wonders of God in Jesus Christ – in the flesh – in the presence – right there. And at times, when I'm reading the Gospels, I get terribly frustrated with the disciples because they just don't get it. They don't see how utterly blessed they are to be chosen as they are, to be there, in the presence of God Almighty.

And scripture doesn't help us too much. In Jesus we have a God who we can touch, but poor Moses – all he got was a burning bush without a definite name. Jacob got a stranger by the riverside who knocked his hip joint out of socket. Adam and Eve got something of God as God was walking through the Garden of Eden. Others witnessed theophanies (miraculous signs that could only be explained by God's omnipotence) – pillars of salt and fire, mighty clouds, divided seas, etc., and still, STILL, some didn't believe. I stand in awe when I read the stories of God's mightiness and then I shrink back in my questions, wondering if my imagination isn't painting grand enough pictures of who God is and who God would be if I could just reach out and touch and believe.

We have a bigger challenge than the few who in ancient Israel were privy to theophanies and Jesus himself. We are to remember that now God manifests in different ways. God is in the kindness of a stranger or in our consciousness that drives us to "do no harm and do good." It's a challenge to find God, or at least remember that God is there, in the created order — in the changing colors of the leaves or the peaceful calm after a storm. It's a challenge to find God in one-another when we're so often exposed only to the brokenness of humanity and aren't as exposed to those who devote

themselves to helping others. And it's a struggle to not want what they had – to not covet the experience of being in the reach-out-and-touch-his-robes presence of Jesus.

Discipleship begins first with belief. We are to be disciplined in making whatever time and space we need to discover God in things that are far different from what we read in scripture. Maybe we find God in worship (I hope you do), but what about Monday? Do we see God when we look in the mirror, disheveled and consumed by the day ahead, and give thanks that what's reflected is God's image? Do we proverbially take time to stop and smell the roses – stop and notice God in the created order? How about in our close relationships? Do we see how the grace of God manifests itself in what we receive from those who become a part of our daily ins-and-outs? Do you want to join me in making this a part of your daily discipline? Will you pray with and for me?



#### **Volunteer Training**

We provide volunteer training on an ongoing basis, but each year we also hold a volunteer training session right before the season starts.
