

Hymn of Promise

In the bulb there is a flower; in the seed, an apple tree; In cocoons, a hidden promise: butterflies will soon be free! In the cold and snow of winter there's a spring that waits to be, Unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.

There's a song in every silence, seeking word and melody; There's a dawn in every darkness, bringing hope to you and me. From the past will come the future; what it holds, a mystery, Unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.

In our end is our beginning; in our time, infinity; In our doubt there is believing; in our life, eternity, In our death, a resurrection; at the last, a victory, Unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.



Some of you are aware that Hymn of Promise is my favorite hymn. From time to time I fight myself to not request we sing it for worship because, as perfect as I believe it is, I know that eventually it would become a broken record and many of you would come to approach the incredible expanse of theology and reflection that is in these short three verses with rote disdain. I don't want that at all. I want you to see the creation imagery as I do and hear and feel the words of hope and resurrection as you're reminded of God's vision for your life. Didn't hear that before in this hymn? Perhaps you will in the future.

For the last seven years, I've requested this hymn to be sung on days I've scheduled a baptism. It has a lot of *alpha* language in it — a lot of beginning of new life imagery which is a prevalent piece of baptismal theology. In baptism we begin something new. We enter the starting gate of a race we pledge to run with perseverance the rest of our lives.

And, for the three times that I've been on the planning side of a funeral (both my grandfathers and my mother), I've requested this sung at their memorial services. *In our end is our beginning; in our time, infinity.....In our death a resurrection.....something God alone can see* — *(continued on page 3)*

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much needed words of resurrection hope that have always offered me peace in a time of death.

Do you see why I love this hymn? In a way it offers something for every season of life — from birth and growth to a metamorphosis as we grow and change into our created purpose. It enters into the valley of the shadow of death reminding us that, in the quiet darkness that is the end, there is a song of hope and something worth waiting for on the other side of grief. And it takes us to the end, which is really just the beginning for those who have resurrection hope.

We have resurrection hope. At some point in our lives — birth, life, struggle, doubt, joy, song, or death — we have experienced, believed in, and professed an empty tomb. We have stood in the valley of the shadow of death many times this year already and grappled with fear and doubt and still, people of faith, we have professed a resurrection victory in Christ Jesus.

Be encouraged knowing that in every death there is a resurrection and in every end — a beginning. There is a God who **is** an ardent promise-keeper, who will reveal to us that promise as we move forward in faith. Simply, *unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.*

That is one of the great things about this ministry—you do not have to be at Trinity the whole time to help our unsheltered guests. Some volunteers only come to set up beds in the sleeping rooms. Others drive the van and greet our guests. Some come just to spend the night.

We even have a crew of people who wash the linens. Most weeks we have 15 or more laundry loads. Two weeks ago, I sent an email to the laundry volunteers from last season and within four hours all had responded and committed to doing more laundry this season. We greatly appreciate these ladies for their time and efforts: Sally Ramsey, Mallory Binkley, Cile Brooks, Beth Bradley, Alicia Huettel, Jeri Ashley, Donna Windham, Rosemary Potter and Melissa Bridgman. BENEVOLENCE GIVING UPDATE

Thank you for your generosity in donating to the grocery voucher fund so we can continue to help those who lack the basic needs for life. Since our last Trinotes, we have handed out seven vouchers at \$25 each.



Because of the great demand for food vouchers,

and in order to be good stewards of the resources available to us, we now distribute vouchers on the first and third Wednesday of each month. An

applicant can call the office to request a voucher. His/her name is put on a list for the next Wednesday on which vouchers are distributed, and on that day applicants come to the education building, picture ID in hand, to pick up their vouchers. Because we have to limit the numbers distributed, we have to turn some people away. Priority is given to families with children. Twelve vouchers are promised so far for November 15th.

The need for assistance in acquiring the essentials of life is ongoing among the poor in our community. We hope that you will continue your contributions to our grocery voucher fund so we can, in a small way, meet the needs of "the least of these."

1963 Beautiful Landscape:

Included young plants, boxwood, holly, barberry, spirea, beds of blooming azaleas.

2008 Overgrown Landscape:

Azaleas reaching for the moon; vagrants sleeping behind massive shrubs. The Covenant Class took action and removed all plants on the north end of the Evergreen entryway and replacement them with young new plants: cleyera, loropetalums, and colorful annuals. An enthusiastic landscape committee was formed to maintain this area and gradually took on other areas, including Elizabeth's Garden and the front entrance beds.

2017 Landscape Needs Assessment presented to Church Council:

A brief summary of urgent needs:

Remove dead and invasive plants, including monkey and Johnson grasses. Prune all plants. Apply preemergent herbicide and mulch. Build a leaf collection bin to create mulch. Build raised front entry beds. Buy supplies, retainers, soil conditioner, and mulch.

Summary:

Trinity's landscape needs are great, and the work force is small. Optimistically, plans are to chip away (or should we say, "prune away") until the Trinity landscape is beautiful again. Bear with us. This will take time, and severely pruned plants will need time to recover their beauty. Volunteers, please call Chris Glover at (901) 358-7201.
