

Participate in Anticipation

Comfort, comfort my people, says your God.
Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and proclaim to her that her hard service has been completed, that her sin has been paid for, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins. A voice of one calling: "In the

wilderness prepare the way for the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be raised up, every mountain and hill made low; the rough ground shall become level, the rugged places a plain. And the glory of the Lord will be revealed, and all people will see it together. For the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

It happened the moment the clock struck midnight Thanksgiving evening. Like a gentle rush through the house, the magic moved from room -to-room. It seems like just yesterday we were throwing on our costumes to go out in the pouring-down rain to trick-or-treat, but that day is gone. Thanksgiving felt like a blink. It was here and then it was gone and now.....now it's time for Christmas.

Except it isn't. It isn't actually time for Christmas. The Christmas season is Christmas Day (December 25th) through Epiphany (January 6th) — 12 days of Christmas. What it's actually time for is Advent — a season of great anticipation.

And so, to celebrate the season of Advent (at least I'll tell myself that) we put up three Christmas trees, hung lights from the parsonage roof, and at about 5:30 every night, now we plug in a blow up Santa train in the front yard. None of that feels very "Adventy" so I also made sure to put up the nativity.

Our nativity sits on a beautiful table inside the front door of the parsonage in front of a lovely antique mirror. I take no credit for these beautiful pieces. They belong to the parsonage, but they are my favorites, and it is the perfect spot for my favorite nativity.

This nativity is absolutely beautiful. It's lines are simple. The figures don't have faces, so one might imagine what they would reflect. There's the Holy Family, shepherds, wisemen (who don't really belong there just yet), a camel, a donkey, a few black sheep, a few white sheep, and a couple of goats. There are no small details. It's very simple and neutral. It makes me feel like Advent and *almost* keeps me from rushing to Christmas.

I say almost because my beautiful Willow Tree nativity has one major flaw. No, it's not the wisemen, who are about two years too early. I can handle that. The one major flaw in its design is that you cannot remove the baby Jesus from the manger.

I have a fun history of visiting nativities, 'borrowing' the baby Jesus, and returning him Christmas Day. It makes some folks a little disgruntled. The baby is there to remind us what the season should really be about, right? Yes. The baby Jesus reminds us what the season of Christmas is really about. But go back and re-read for me. That season is 12 days long and begins on December 25th. An empty manger reminds us that there are other things that we must first observe in anticipation of the coming of Christ.

The season of Advent, which begins this Sunday, is a time where we participate in anticipation. It's a time where we look to the past and we look to the future so that we can understand Christ's influence on the present. We remember all that Mary and Joseph experienced before the manger was full—and God's presence with us—before God's incarnation was with us. We don't rush because we'll miss all of these things (and many more), and without them we can't completely embrace the reason for the season.

So empty your mangers if you can. It's not time yet. Participate. We'll walk through all of this together in worship, so I hope you'll be here to participate. Come and hear. Hear the stories from scripture. Hear the Advent offerings of the choir. Sing the Advent hymns. Connect. Connect to the Word until it's time again to celebrate, together, the Word incarnate.

Our volunteers continue to amaze me with their commitment to this ministry, but more volunteers are needed.

More Volunteers Needed

Our volunteer base is smaller this year. A few of our volunteers have passed away, a few more have moved away, and others now have more pressing commitments. If you or anyone you know might be interested in helping with this ministry, please send them my way (loislane.young@gmail.com or 870-559-2228). These volunteer positions often need more helping hands:

- Hospitality at Carpenter's House (North Second Street and Exchange Avenue 4:15 to 5:45 p.m.) Welcome our guests as they wait at Carpenter's House to be picked up.
- Setup sleeping areas (Start at 4 p.m.) Making beds usually takes less than an hour.
- Evening van driver (5:15–5:45 p.m.) Drive church van to pick up guests downtown.
- Greeters (5:45–6:30 p.m.) help our guests find their way around the building.
- **Servers** (6:15–7:15 p.m.) help serve drinks and food and sit down to eat with our guests.
- Hang out with guests during movie time (7:30–9 p.m.)
- Overnight volunteers (arrive as late as 9 p.m. and leave as early as 5:30 a.m.) An experienced overnight volunteer will be present.
- Morning cleanup (7 until about 7:30 am.) Help us pull sheets, wipe down mattresses and put them away.

Kroger Community Rewards

According to Kroger Company Family of Stores, 20 households are already designating Trinity UMC as the non-profit organization to receive a percentage of their grocery purchases. Once a quarter, Trinity receives a check from Kroger from the proceeds of those purchases. If you are not already participating in this program and do your grocery shopping at Kroger, we encourage you to consider linking your rewards card to Trinity UMC. The newly assigned organization number for Trinity is HC876. All you need to do is go to the Customer Service desk at your Kroger store and ask the clerk to help you sign up. (Those already participating do not need to make any changes to their rewards cards, but these need to be renewed annually.) Also, we have been assured that, in order to meet their customers' expectation of privacy, Kroger has adopted a simple policy to never share a customer's personal information.

We have hopes to set up a pallet board wall for their corner (replacing the lattice walls) – something that will identify the space: "Children's Corner." We'd like to outfit the space with "quiet toy" bags. The nursery wants to bring a rocking chair upstairs so that there's a place in worship where any parent with an infant can rock a child without having to bring that child to the nursery. We hope that with all that we are, Trinity might 'say' with this corner that children are welcome, not only in the building, but in worship, and maybe even that we want them there.

If you would like to contribute to Children's Corner, please do so. It won't take much to make this makeover happen, but it'll make a big, long-lasting difference.
