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

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# Hope

Most of you haven't been in the parsonage yet. That's intentional. There may or may not be one room that is still half-full of unpacked boxes. Usually there are children's goldfish snacks buried somewhere

in the couch. In better words: it's very much home. We very much live in every inch of the parsonage. One of my favorite spots isn't inside, but the porch swing.

At night I've gotten into the habit of putting the boys to bed, wrapping up in something fleece, and going outside to sit on the porch for a bit. You can hear the students at Rhodes from my porch but it's not too loud and so it is kind of a nice place to sit. In the summer things were much quieter, as the students were home for break. In the summer there were also birds EVERYWHERE. Lately I've seen fewer and I think I know why.

You can smell it. Winter has a smell and right now it's faint but when I come outside at night it's there. The air is crisp instead of humid. Things are quieter. The earth is preparing for a change. It's as if she is sighing -- her breathing is slowing down -- she's preparing for a long sleep.

With some sense of irony, though, as the earth prepares to die, the church wakes up. We have been, since I have been here, in what is called "ordinary time" in the liturgical year. That came to an end last Sunday as a new year in the life of the church began and this Sunday we will light the first candle of the Advent wreath -- the candle of Hope -- to signify the beginning of Advent. The world outside our doors is preparing to die and the world inside the doors of the church and the lives of Christians across the globe, is preparing to celebrate life -- a life that came hidden in a manger and the life we have because of his birth.

The first Sunday in Advent reminds us to look forward to the end of days when we can anticipate the coming of Christ in a much more victorious way than a baby in a manger. Looking forward we are called to alertness -- to vigilance. And so, good Christian people, it's time to be awake and to remember.

When we joined the church, we came to a place where we felt at home, where we could bring every bit of who we are, and where we felt the presence of Christ. We still gather for those reasons and for many others. As we come this season and make the journey to Bethlehem alongside one another, it is my prayer that we are alert. I hope that our eyes might be opened to understand just how amazing it is that we have (continued on page 3)

## Why or Why Not?

The question has been asked "Why don't we move back to the sanctuary during the winter?" The Trustees considered this option a few months ago. Their decision was to remain as we are, in the Education Building. The following are reasons they decided it was advantageous to both the congregation and Trinity to remain in one building:

- We would have to move everything back to the Education Building in three to four months since there is no air conditioning in the sanctuary. We do not have the manpower or budget to be constantly shifting locations.
- The elevator in the sanctuary building is notoriously unreliable.
- The piano has been moved from the sanctuary to the Fellowship Hall. Moving it is expensive and not good for the instrument.
- The plaster ceiling in the choir loft is falling on the choir.
- For security reasons, the children and youth must be in the same building as their parents.
- The youth have a newly renovated, dedicated room in the Education Building but nothing in the sanctuary building.
- The dedicated teachers of the children's department have set up an excellent learning environment for providing age appropriate biblically based learning. In this room real learning is taking place.

The above are some of the things the Trustees considered when deciding not to move back to the sanctuary at this time. The one exception will be the Christmas Eve Service, which will be held in the sanctuary on Sunday, December 24th at 4:00 p.m.

I was sick last Tuesday night, but Rosemary Potter, Jeanne Napoli and our crew of regular volunteers made sure everything worked perfectly for our guests. Many thanks for their dedication to helping our unsheltered neighbors.

On Wednesday morning, all our guests were happy to have been inside during the cold night. I recognized one man that we have seen several times over the past five years. Robert is quiet but friendly and always thankful for our hospitality. I don't know his story, and I'm not going to ask. Some guests will share their whole story the first time you meet them, others will hold it close. What I do know is that none of these individuals would be coming to us if they didn't need something we have to offer at Room in the Inn.

A few years ago, the late June Averyt, a social worker and founder of Outreach Housing & Community, would stop in on Tuesday nights and interview our guests in hopes of finding services that could help them, especially housing. One night after most guests had gone to bed, she pulled me aside and said, "You know a few of these people have other places they could stay, but they choose to come here." In other words, we were offering something they couldn't get in those other places. What was it? Kindness, a listening ear, a comforting meal, a feeling of worth? Whatever it is, we need to keep offering it to all those who come searching.

Around this time of year we often hear "What are you thankful for?" I'm thankful for all of you who care for the poor, the homeless and the outcast. I'm thankful that we can help them find what they are looking for even if it is just for one night.
