

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The Mission

"You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hidden." Matthew 5:14

I remember it like it was yesterday. It was a Saturday morning in early April. I was sitting around sipping coffee. Josh had driven in from

Springfield, Tennessee, where he was serving a church in youth ministry. We were both pretty quiet and still and both, like most millennials are, attached to our phones. It was unusual for the ringers to be on, on a Saturday. Saturdays are for the "vibrate" option, but this day was different. Both of our District Superintendents had announced to their districts that this was "announcement day" for pastors, and the following day the Staff/ Pastor Parish Relations chair would announce in worship who'd be the pastor come June.

I was pretty good friends with my DS in Paducah. He'd seen me through my mother's death and counseled me through my divorce. I could pick up the phone and call Sky at all hours and it never *had* to be about ministry. Five weeks prior he'd called me to give me a 'projection.' I was projected to move to an urban church setting in Memphis — a racially diverse congregation that was booming with youth and passionate about mission. It was in an area of Memphis I wasn't at all familiar with, and I'd be following someone very-well-loved — someone I'd looked up to most of my life. I was nervous. I was excited, but something felt *off* about the projection. This day — this Saturday — was the day I'd hear for closer-to-certain if that projection would hold. Nothing is ever final until it's voted on in June at Annual Conference.

My phone rang first. I'll never forget. I put the coffee mug down. My computer was in my lap. I looked down at my phone — Sky McCracken. I answered like I always did. "Hey." Sky was my friend. For five weeks I'd known and spent time preparing my heart and soul for what this move would mean. Knowing that it's not very smart, I'd already begun to pack my boxes. I'd snuck down to Memphis and looked around the church campus. Most importantly, I'd prayed. "God, just help me to be faithful." I was ready — hesitant, but ready.

"Sara, there's been a change."

My heart hit the floor. What? No.....Things don't change.

Projections hardly ever change especially not for, you know, people like me. I'm young. I'm not being considered for some large church appointment. Folks really shouldn't be sitting around and thinking enough about me that this projection should change.

"You'll be going to Trinity in Memphis."

"Where's THAT? It's familiar. I'm sure I've been there. (I had.)"

"You know. Trinity. It's near the zoo."

Then, with my right hand holding the phone I began to ask all the questions I could muster. With my left hand, I google searched "Trinity UMC, Memphis," and this is what I'll never forget....

The very first thing you see when you go to our website is this statement of intent — a statement about who is included in this community of faith:

Our congregation intends to reflect the love of God to all people and seeks a community of individuals who are diverse in viewpoint, age, physical and intellectual ability, economic status, immigration status, ethnicity, culture, gender identity, and sexual orientation.

Wow, I thought. I can get behind that.

If you click on "about" the first thing you see (the first thing I saw) is the mission statement:

The Mission of Trinity United Methodist Church is to proclaim God's love by building community and living by the example and teachings of Jesus Christ.

Wow. If they really mean that, I can really get behind that. Oh, the places we'll go. Oh, the things we'll do!

Before Sky and I were finished talking, I was crying. He didn't know it. At least, I don't think he did. When I first felt a call to ministry nearly 20 years prior to my Saturday phone call, this is what I always envisioned I'd be a part of. And, at that point, I couldn't say: that's where I'd been serving. It had been hard, dirty, road-paving work that left me worn and weary of the call. Trinity promised to be world-changing — a city on a hill that couldn't be hidden, and it has been. I was being commissioned to be a part of it, and my heart was suddenly so full, it could burst.

And so, we have done much.

I want to air some caution, though. Admittedly, when I was trying to think of our mission statement the other day, I couldn't remember it. I remembered the gist. But, it's not enough to remember the gist. Our mission statement is the lens through which we see what we do and who we are. It's not secondary to what we do. It's **what we do**. Our statement of inclusion is who we've chosen to be in ministry with, so that we can fulfill

Our mission is the lens through which we make every single decision we make. Do we sell part of our property? How does that help us "proclaim God's love by building community and live by the example and teachings of Christ?" Who (other than us) in our inclusion statement is more included because we've let go of the responsibility of two campuses? Do we continue our Room in the Inn program in the summer? How is that building community as Christ taught? Who is more included because we did it? Do we take up hats for local school students in the winter? Do we have an Easter egg hunt for the community? Do we cut down a tree in the parking lot that is rotting and might hurt people? Do we agree to be a polling station during election season? Do we work around the schedules of everyone else we've said, "Yes," to in our building? Midtown Montessori? Bluff City Church? Narcotics Anonymous? Scouts? The Evergreen Historic District Association? Are these things enabling us to build community as Christ taught? Are they engendering a culture of inclusivity? Is this our lens, still?

I hope you are better than I am. I hope you know our Mission and Vision statements by heart, especially if you are in church leadership. I hope when you reflect on who Trinity is, that you reflect like I do. Trinity is a beacon of hope and light in midtown Memphis. The neighborhood values its presence and supports its ministries. Trinity feeds hungry people, clothes people who are without adequate clothing, and houses the homeless. It values children and encourages connection, ministry, and relationship with them. Trinity isn't afraid to be in ministry with those who suffer amid addiction. It isn't afraid to bend and be flexible. It welcomes the sojourner — the nomad — the lost. Trinity is working hard, in every way, to be a glimpse of God's Kingdom today.

I hope that is what you think of, when you think of Trinity United Methodist Church and I hope that all of our next steps can only bring to light more and more ways that our being faithful fulfills God's mission.


Launch of TUMC Youth Group
