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# General Conference A Way Forward

I hereby command you: Be strong and courageous; do not

be frightened or dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." — Joshua 1:9

It's Monday morning and I lament that I am home and in bed trying to find the strength to attend a noonday funeral. Rest, I'm told, is always the best medicine for the sinus "fun" that accompanies Memphis' weather confusion. But I cannot rest. It is difficult to rest. I am unsettled.

As I lay here writing, live-streaming on another device is the called United Methodist General Conference in St. Louis. I'm listening because it's historic — only one other time has there been a called General Conference of the United Methodist Church. It's historic because it, inevitably, will change the church I love. No matter what is laid on the table, the church is facing a schism of sorts, whether that be in actual function and polity or in heart, mind, and soul. The church I love is on the chopping block and yet, the church I love does not yet exist.

The conference is meeting after nearly two years of organizing. A called commission, the Commission on a Way Forward, has been gathering with one purpose in mind — to place before this General Conference opportunities for the church to remain unified in its belief and practice concerning the Book of Discipline's stance on the ordination of gay, lesbian, transgendered, and bisexual candidates for ministry as well as our current clergy's ability (and the church legality thereof) of marrying same-sex couples. For many of us, the matters are very black and white. However, we are a global church. There are church conferences within our structure in places where being gay is illegal or where one might be killed for being so. The matter is complex because in those regions the church is growing and the

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delegation is larger than it is in our immediate context that, in most ways, is more progressive. Maintaining unity of spirit and practice is difficult and a clarity of conscience, for many, is on the line, including my own.

I lay here in bed, feeling terrible already, wondering what will become of a church that I am called to serve. The discussion is painful because I have many brothers and sisters in Christ who are LGBT brothers and sisters in Christ who exhibit clear callings to ministry and are stifled, painfully so, by our current polity. This conference will either open the door for people of God to serve the church they are called to serve, or will close it. The weight of that decision falls on the shoulders of many who aren't at all directly affected and there is no way that the conference's function can "do no harm." But here we are.

When I was being interviewed for my elder's orders, Rev. Steve Cavitt asked me a question that felt so very easy to answer at the time. "With what's on the line (the called General Conference), will you stick it out?" At the time I had no doubt that the UMC would remain forward facing — that we believed the love and ministry of God belonged to everyone called by God despite their sexual orientation. I knew we'd err of the side of love because that is a faithful response and the UMC has always been faithful. "Yes, Steve. The UMC is my home. It is just as much a part of me as I am of it." And yet, I lie here scared for it. I lie here embracing my "alternative spiritual gift" — that of worry. I am concerned for what tomorrow (literally, tomorrow) will bring for the church. Where I had once been hopeful, I can see with clarity now that some sort of death is inevitable.

And yet, there may be the hope. There may be painful, insensitive words shared during the "Christian conferencing" that's taking place in St. Louis today. Progressives may leave in mass exodus or traditionalists, for that matter. Church doors may close for good. Clergy with a crisis of conscience may leave for other denominations that are more affirming of inclusion. Death may very really come. And yet, can there be a resurrection without death? Was there an empty tomb without a cross or a cross

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without a trial? Is this our trial, church? I think so. Is this the hammer driving nails for the last time for many? Likely so. Is this the spear in our side releasing what's left of our life-source. No. It absolutely is not.

The people called United Methodist will find life tomorrow. Our hope remains in God our Savior -- a hope that belongs to everyone who is called "beloved" — everyone who is a child of God. History will continue to teach us what it means to truly do no harm, to do good, and to stay in love with God. The fresh wounds will become scars that remind us of either who we want to be or who we will be next. And regardless of the choices we have made or will make, the Spirit of God will never leave us or forsake us.

I am broken but never hopeless. Let us, together, remain steadfast — filled with hope, offering love, and walking in faith.

# Ash Wednesday

"Hear and I will speak; I will question you and you will declare to me. I had heard you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eyes see you; therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the season of Lent. Lent is a season marked by wilderness wanderings, ascetic practices (fasting), and embracing prayers as a means by which we are one with God. During Lent you are encouraged to give up something that works to separate you from a disciplined relationship with God. The imposition of the ashes is an external sign of repentance. Our ashes

come from the burning of the palms from last year's Palm Sunday Service. They signify life and death and are given new life as we repent and return to God. This year we will worship Wednesday, March 6th at 6:30 in the Worship Center. Please join us for this meaningful service that begins the season of Lent.

### If others would join you, what would you do?

During the summer I told you that Room in the Inn at Trinity UMC received 576 pairs of socks from the Bombas Socks company. For every pair of Bombas socks purchased, they donate a pair to groups that serve the homeless. They definitely follow through with that pledge. Kim Guleff contacted Bombas again in January on our behalf. They agreed to send us a thousand pairs of socks in February.

There was a computer glitch of some kind, and Bombas ended up sending us 3,500 pairs of high quality crew socks. Wow! That is a ton of socks. Carey Miller and Jan Young can attest to the fact that it feels like a ton when you are lifting box after box after box. Carey was kind enough to place all these boxes in a storage closet upstairs, and then Jan removed them all from the closet when it was time for us to sort them and box them up for other Room in the Inn sites.

We could never use this many socks in our Trinity clothes closet, so we are sharing them with 16 other Room in the Inn-Memphis locations. That way all our unsheltered guests can get the socks they need. As a little "thank you" to Bombas, I ordered four pairs of socks. They are expensive, but I think they might be the most comfortable socks I have ever worn. I will be buying more soon. I encourage you to do the same. They definitely follow through on their pledge to help those in need.
