Don't Forget the Tiny Pantry!



We may not be using the building very much right now, but we still have unsheltered or needy neighbors who may come by to look for assistance feeding their families or just themselves. When you have groceries delivered or when you don your mask to brave the grocery store aisles, pick up some canned goods (preferably with pop-tops) that will fit in a backpack or duffel bag, something not requiring refrigeration, especially protein-rich foods such as tuna, peanut butter, or protein bars. Stock the Pantry!

Fishes and Loaves Food Pantry at Binghampton UMM, 258 N. Merton St., is open on Tuesdays and Fridays from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. for distribution of fresh fruits and vegetables....people can come as often as they want for these.

Once a month, folks can request an emergency food bag (canned goods, peanut butter, cereal, rice, dried beans, soup, etc). Neither of these options require any proof of residency or need.....you ask, you receive. Individuals and families who need an emergency food bag can call Michael Anderson at (901) 503-2748.

Jesus in the Garden

This Sunday's lesson in the Children's Sunday School Class is "Jesus in the Garden," based on Matthew 26:36-46. This is the story of Jesus' visit to the garden of Gethsemane to pray before his arrest. Jesus is aware that his death is imminent, and his struggle to remain obedient to his Father is very real. When he goes to the garden to pray, he is sad and anxious, revealing his humanness. Jesus also desires human companionship,

bringing the same "inner circle" who witnessed his transfiguration, Peter, James, and John, as he goes further into the garden to pray. These same friends reveal their very human nature, too, as they fail to stay awake and pray with Jesus and as they eventually desert him and run away in fear.


Our lessons each week have a video segment with a child host. The children who are hosts help us to approach these lessons from a child's point of view. This week's host, Abigail, reminds our children that Jesus was having a hard time because he was sad and nervous about what was to come. But Jesus had such a close relationship with God that he called him "Abba," which means "Daddy." And he was able to pray, "Yet not what I want, but what you want." As Abigail reminds us, knowing we can always go to God about anything really helps, and whatever we're feeling, God is with us.

The following week, we will begin a new unit of study. Our new FAITH WORD will be HOLY WEEK, "a time when we remember the life and death of Jesus, beginning with Palm Sunday and ending with Holy Saturday." We will continue with the disciples' struggle with their own humanity, as we study about Peter, who is overwhelmed by fear and denies his association with Jesus three times. As the rooster crows, Peter remembers Jesus' prediction that he would deny him, and he weeps bitterly.

As we teach our children about Peter's denial of Jesus, we want them to know that this is not the end of the story for Peter – or for us. Yes, Peter messed up, just as we all mess up at some point. Samuel, our child host for this lesson, reminds our children that we can all learn from our mistakes so we can do better the next time. Bad moments don't make you a bad person. Indeed, the good news for all God's children, no matter how old we are, is that just as Peter was forgiven by Jesus and then given another chance, so are we.

Ukraine: UMC Response

The following is an excerpt from a statement made recently by the United Methodist General Board of Global Ministries regarding the crisis in Ukraine:

"The General Board of Global Ministries of The United Methodist Church is deeply troubled by the conflict between Russia and Ukraine and the ominous implications it has for escalating tensions between Russia and Western nations. We join many Christian leaders and organizations worldwide in deploring the Russian invasion of Ukraine on February 24, and we ardently pray for a redirection of military action toward diplomatic measures to resolve grievances. United Methodists are people of peace.

The United Methodist Church has mission-founded congregations in both Ukraine and Russia, some from the pre-Soviet period and others dating from post-Soviet years. Both countries are geographically within the Eurasia Episcopal Area and relate to the United Methodist central conferences of Europe. Bishop Eduard Khegay, the resident episcopal leader in Eurasia, is based in Moscow."

In this vein, we invite you to please read and learn from the following list of resources regarding the conflict and the UMC's global response, as well as strongly encourage your prayers for and financial support to the people of Ukraine.

The independent charity watchdog, "Charity Watch," gives UMCOR an "A+" ranking, and includes the UM organization on a highly selective list of charities it recommends when considering how to support the Ukrainian people.

The United Methodist community in Ukraine, though quite small, is actively engaged in assisting neighbors in need. Global Ministries is in touch with the church's leadership as well as with church leaders in countries welcoming those who are fleeing from violence in Ukraine.

BITS 'N DIECES


