

home to Memphis. Their wonder, and excitement, and utter joy made me grin a tired grin.

I found a spot close enough to the water that I could keep an eye on the boys — not yet 'real' swimmers. I watched the gulls fly over and the boats pulling parasailers in the distance. And in a moment of clarity I realized, "It's Sunday." For a moment guilt washed over me. This wasn't a pulpit. It wasn't even a pew. We weren't in church. I was wearing a raggedy t-shirt and stretchy capri pants with flip flops. My hair was wind-blown and make-up was carelessly thrown on my face. I didn't even know what time it was. I hadn't much thought of what my appearance was or what time it was for days. More importantly, I wasn't with people — people of faith — other Christians. I was mostly alone on a beach with my family and it was Sunday.

But the guilt, as quickly as it came, left. I'd spent the better part of two hours, already, worshipping. I'd given thanks to God for the peace-filled moments — for the sounds of the ocean and it's beauty — for the laughter of my children and their joy — for the faithfulness of my husband and his love for us — for the goodness of a congregation that joined me in the joy of taking time away. The sun in the sky and the birds singing their flight songs, had brought me to tears of happiness as I'd felt a renewal of life and perspective that could only be achieved in the "break."

These moments reminded me that worship can happen anywhere and also that no one needs to create a worship space for us. God is in every beautiful thing that we experience and yearns for our praise and our joy. God calls us to a holy sense of rest and peace called sabbath, knowing that in that sabbath rest we will hear so clearly what God has to share. The church has no walls. John Wesley is known for saying, "The world is my parish," and so it is. And, whether it be Sunday morning, Wednesday afternoon, or late Friday night, God hopes that we'll search for ways to be in communion, not only with God, but also those whom God loves.

I suppose that moment of guilt was helpful. It reminded me of the holiness of that time — that time away from the pulpit — away from the pews, where God still was and is and will forever be.

### CONNECTION IS IN OUR DNA

I am fascinated by our early Methodist history. I believe that origin stories have a lot to teach us. You may have heard the term "class meeting" from the Methodist origin story. Every person was required to be part of a class or small group that met weekly. Did you also know that each small group reached deep into the community caring for many different types of needs and alongside many kinds of partners? There were connections to health clinics, schools, charity missions such as the Strangers' Friend Society, and prisons.

The founder of Methodism, John Wesley, was clear that God is known through means of grace. I believe that God's grace flows through our connections to each other within the walls of the church and beyond. I think it is fascinating to think about how our connection and partnership with the Boy Scouts, Snowden Elementary, Rhodes College, or Evergreen Neighborhood Association is a means of grace, a vehicle through which God becomes more deeply known by others.

At our next Community Connections Gathering, we will take some time to inventory all of Trinity UMC's current partnerships and connections. We will celebrate what God has done through these partnerships and begin to imagine what else could be done. How else could our connections into the community and partnerships with other organizations be a catalyst for others to more deeply know God and know themselves as God's beloved children?

I love the way the power of connection in the early Methodist movement is captured by Theodore Runyan's book, <u>The New Creation: John Wesley's Theology Today</u>. He writes that by these connections into the community "the spirit of the movement extended into the community an evangelism based, not on the hard sell, but by the inherent attractiveness of a holistic concern for persons at the point of their need."

What an amazing origin story we have! What a faithful witness to that heritage TUMC has been! I can't wait to see what else God has in store for TUMC in our little corner of Memphis! Let's keep discovering and discerning together on April 6.
