their pennies. I've told them, though, that it might also be smart to save a little of it in case something they find that they want to buy becomes available, so that they'll have the money they need when the time comes. Also, I've begun to talk to them about what it will mean to God if they put some of it in the offering plate.

It's a bit of a regret of mine that the offering happens where it does in worship. It's intentional that we take up the offering near the end so that we have the opportunity, if we think about it (and I mean really think about it), to give in such a way that it's a reflection of what we've experienced in worship. We give back to God what is God's for the sake of and work of God. Giving, then, is a part of our worship and a reflection of our faithfulness to the work of God for the sake of God's people. Many of the children aren't present for that, so my lesson at home, in the floor with the pennies strewn about, is very important.

We give so that the church can operate — so that the bulletins can be printed — so that the phones can be answered — so that the food vouchers can be funded — so that we are faithfully living out our membership vows (our prayers, our presence, our gifts, our service, and our witness). We give so that the building stays temperature controlled, the toilets flushed, and the salaries paid. We give so that the ministries are funded and things like the Easter Egg Hunt, Trunk-or-Treat, and Vacation Bible School happen. We give so that curriculum can be bought so that classes can be taught. We give so that our doors can be open and our building used for sheltering the homeless, protecting the addict, and welcoming the sojourner. The reality is, if we don't give, these things won't happen.

And I want the doors of the church to always be open because this is where my children want to be — because this church is making them and molding them into little world-changers for the sake of the Kingdom of God. This church would be missed if its ministries subsided and the need near this little corner at Evergreen and Galloway would grow. I want them to know what a big different their pennies will make, and I want to remind you of the difference yours make as well.

I'll end as I do so often in written correspondence. Be blessed to be a blessing.

UPDATE FROM THE TRUSTEES

As always, the Trustees are working (mostly) behind the scenes on a variety of projects.

First, I'd like the congregation to be aware that Memphis Montessori School

has asked for another extension to their lease through May 2020. Their new building project has experienced additional unforeseen delays and will not be ready at the end of the year. Understanding that this lease extension will put some plans on hold for another six months, the Trustees voted to extend the lease at an increased monthly rent. These additional monies will help with the 2020 budget.

A big thanks to Bill (Mac) McConnell and his crew of many (most recently including Marc Taylor, Carey Miller, Phil Isbell, Steve Humbert, Sam Goff, Joe Hatter, and David Hopper) who have just about finished changing out all the light fixtures in the building to shed more light and save on utilities.

The roofers (finally) are able to get to us, and the flat roof replacement over the kitchen commenced the week of August 26. There may be some disruption in the kitchen area, as the skylights are coming out, so bear with us on that. They expect the project to take 5-10 days to complete (weather permitting).

Around the grounds, we're tending to the overgrown shrubbery on the north side of the playground, next to the garage, and around the perimeter of the building. Things should be looking better in the next week or so. And the parsonage is in need of tree trimming and exterior paint and minor repairs. That's the short list of some of the things the Trustees are tending to. As always, if you have any questions or see something that needs to be repaired/replaced/etc., please contact me, any of the other Trustees, or let Debby know.

Guatemalan Consulate

It's that time once again! It's that moment when we engage the call of the Holy Spirit to be one with our neighbors and be a part — a real and tangible part — of bringing peace to our little corner of the world, and offer help and hope to those who are our immigrant neighbors.

The Guatemalan Mobile Consulate will be held at Trinity September 21st and 22nd. The consulate's office is predicting that they'll see 700+ immigrants from Mississippi, Missouri, Arkansas, Kentucky, and Tennessee. They'll process more than 1000 legal documents (in 36 hours), including passports, for adults and children who will travel here because it's closer than the Guatemalan Consulate office in Atlanta, Georgia.

We will ask our neighbors in Evergreen to be patient and supportive, that they support us and encourage us to hold this event. Many ask how they can help and volunteer. I hope you are asking the same. The following are ways that you can help.

- 1. Sign up to work the event. It can be post-event clean-up. It can be playing with children downstairs. It can be canvasing the neighborhood to make sure driveways aren't blocked and trash is picked up. **Sign up here:** http://bit.ly/GuatemalaVol
- 2. Serve lunch. On Saturday, we are charged with serving lunch to the 8 consulate officers who will be present. It can be as easy as sandwiches. One year we had someone come and fix wonderful paninis in the kitchen. It doesn't have to be hard or complicated. There are no dietary restrictions. It's one meal. Can you?
- 3. Donate toilet paper. We have to 'man' six port-a-potties for 36 hours for 700+ people. Can you donate some Charmin? Any amount will help.
- 4. **Come to worship.** Worship on September 22nd will be at 1:00 in the afternoon in our usual spot. It will be a joint worship service with two area Hispanic worshiping bodies who have, for six consulate events now, partnered with us to make the mobile consulate happen. Worship will be very much like it usually is, with a few addendums to make it inclusive of our Spanish-speaking sisters and brothers. But we need you the most.

In a report to the Church Council recently, Barbara Vann shared that the Fishes and Loaves Food Pantry provided fresh fruits and vegetables to 73 households in the month of June. Emergency bags of staple items were provided to 69 households in June, as well. In the month of July, 72 households received fresh produce, while 71 homes received emergency bags of canned goods and other staples. The staple items you bring to church for the food pantry are essential contributions to this ministry.

The Really Really Free Market is held each second Saturday of the month and continues to be well attended and supplied. The next Market will be held on September 14th between 1:00 and 3:00 p.m. at 258 S. Merton St.

Work in the Binghampton Land Trust continues and, as the immigration landscape continues to change, the folks at Binghampton have learned to be flexible and open in responding to the needs of the larger community.  Conference apportionments run 30 days behind during the year and we will make two payments in December, one for the month of November and one for the month of December.

As of July 31, we had revenue lower than originally projected (shortfall of \$11,000) and slightly lower expenditures than budgeted for the first seven months of the year. The end result is a deficit of (\$17,370) which is above the budgeted deficit of (\$9,913). That's a difference of (\$7,457).

Where is the shortfall? It is in the pledged and non-pledged giving. Both are well under budget and the two total a shortage of (\$12,058). Summer months are usually lighter in income but this year has been especially so. On the other hand, we have done a good job managing our expenses.

What do all these numbers mean? Because we have had such a decrease in giving for the past two or three months, and we will longer have the \$600 per month for rent from Bluff City UMC, the new revised projected loss as of now is at (\$7,585) instead of the original net income projection of \$2,300.

Before everyone throws up their hands in despair, let's remember that Trinity has been blessed with generous giving over the years, and there are several restricted accounts that we could tap into if absolutely necessary. Many churches do not have such funds. Should we be able to pay our expenses out of our operating income? Of course! It nice to know, however, that there is a safety net.

How can you help with this shortfall? What can you do? If you are financially able, please consider an additional gift to the operating budget. If you have pledged funds or give regularly but haven't been in town to get the check to the church, please do so as soon as possible. Thanks!
