The Invitation



"But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. And you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous." — Luke 14:13-14

Not long ago, we gathered in worship. It was the first Sunday in September. We gathered expectant and ready to worship — ready to gather at the table for communion — and ready to receive what God had to offer. We gathered expectant, as we should.

That morning we discussed the parable of the wedding banquet. You know the one. It was the banquet to which the well-liked, upstanding society members were invited, and began to position themselves for the places of honor at the table, rather than waiting and being called to the seats of honor. Jesus reminded those listening to humble themselves, first, but then to extend themselves to those who are least likely to be invited to the banquet at all. The most meaningful thing I took away in my studying and in my writing was this: Invite the unlikely, unexpected guests. Invite. Because why would they come without an invitation?

I've mulled this over again and again for a few weeks now. Perhaps you have, as well. I hope you have. I hope you, in hearing those words, or in reading them now, can say with confidence, "We do that!" or, "I do that!" That is something great to celebrate because, at the very least, well, that's what Jesus said to do and being a disciple means living after his words and examples.

On September 29th, Trinity will be participating in Memphis PRIDE. This isn't the first time. Two years ago we had a table and many of you came and worked it throughout the day. Our music director, John Holtzman, was pro-active in setting up our booth and introducing us to the many folks in his circle who attend PRIDE. The experience was beautiful in that it put us in the middle of a group of folks who, in our age, would be unlikely, unexpected guests in Christian worship spaces. This particular community, the LGBT+ community, has, at times, been

admonished by the Church, rather than loved by it. And so, being *intentional* about developing these relationships works to heal a wound that otherwise is ignored, and we all know what happens to ignored wounds. Our table was an example of the church being the church Jesus said should go and invite. In inviting, we emulate the love of Jesus and in loving we are answering our call to do all we are called to do.

This is the value of being present and of being intentional — connecting with the unlikely and unexpected, because why would they come if they're never invited?

If you'd like to work our table for PRIDE, please let me know. It will touch your heart in a way you may not expect. And remember, all we are ever called to be is faithful.

Guatemalan Consulate

The Guatemalan Mobile Consulate will be held at Trinity September 21st and 22nd. The consulate's office is predicting that they'll see 700+ immigrants from Mississippi, Missouri, Arkansas, Kentucky, and Tennessee. They'll process more than 1000 legal documents (in 36 hours), including passports, for adults and children who will travel here because it's closer than the Guatemalan Consulate office (Atlanta, GA).

We have asked our neighbors in Evergreen to be patient and supportive. They support us and encourage us to hold this event.

The following are ways that **you** can help:

Sign up to work the event. It can be post-event clean-up. It can
be playing with children downstairs. It can be canvassing the
neighborhood to make sure driveways aren't blocked and trash
is picked up.

• Serve lunch. On Saturday, we are charged with serving lunch to the 8 consulate officers who will be present. It can be as easy as sandwiches. One year we had someone come and fix wonderful paninis in the kitchen. It doesn't have to be hard or complicated. There are no dietary restrictions. It's one meal. Can you?

(No one has volunteered yet. Can you?)

- Donate toilet paper. We have to 'man' 6 port-a-potties for 36 hours for 700+ people. Can you donate some Charmin? Any amount will help.
- Come to worship. Sunday worship will be at 1:00 in the afternoon in our usual spot. It will be a joint worship service with two area Hispanic worshiping bodies who have, for six consulate events now, partnered with us to make the consulate happen. Worship will be very much like it usually is, with a few addendums to make it inclusive of our Spanish-speaking sisters and brothers. But we need you the most. We need you to come and worship still offering your prayers, your presence, your gifts, your service, and your witness. Add to that, offering your hospitality and joy for all we're able to do as a connectional church in ministry alongside others.
- **Pray.** Pray for those traveling from Atlanta to offer their services to these folks. Pray for the volunteers who are coming from all over Memphis to offer their time to help. Pray for Trinity as we continue to be faithful to the commands of Jesus, to love our neighbors as we have been loved and as we love one another.

Trinity: a generous people

Every so often. I have to take a look at the funds available for Trinity's ministries to our neighbors who are struggling with empty pantries, empty refrigerators, and empty wallets. When Jesus said that the poor would be with us always, it was prophetic. He never said it was right or just, he was just stating a fact. He also told us to feed them, to give them water, to clothe them ... for in doing so, we are helping Jesus.

My volunteers and I take calls every day from folks who just don't have enough on which to get by. They call—every day—to ask for help with utilities, rent, and, most of all, groceries. So far in 2019, we have handed out 434 vouchers, each of which allows the recipient to purchase \$25 worth of food or personal items at the Cash Savers on Madison at Avalon. For each individual, that's not a lot of money, but it buys enough for them to get by on for a little while. Consider how much we spend on groceries, and you will admit \$25 doesn't go very far. But also consider the gratitude of 40 people each month who receive food vouchers from this congregation. You are doing a good work here, Trinity. Please accept my personal "Thank You!" Because of you, we don't always have to turn away "the least of these." And know this: there are larger congregations and aid organizations who no longer offer assistance to these desperate people. I know, because I've called a lot of churches and service organizations, looking for referral sources. I'm proud to know you, Trinitarians. ~ Gratefully, Debby M.



Third Gathering for Discovery and Discernment

On August 24, many Trinity members and friends gathered to continue our Discovery and Discernment process, under the leadership of Amy Moritz. We began our morning with a Gallery Walk: We moved around the Worship Center, looking at what we had learned during our previous meetings. This included the gifts individuals had identified in themselves, the asset maps and social network maps that show us what resources are in our neighborhood, the Give-a-Fish activity of current Trinity ministries, the "If Others Would Join Me" bulletin board, and results of personal interviews done by some of our members with neighborhood partners. Next, we considered What (what we had noticed), So What (what patterns are emerging), What if (responses to what we've learned), and Now What (actions). We clustered related Now What's, and six areas of ministry emerged. (Want to know what they are? Look forward to another article in the next TriNotes.) After a closing prayer, we stepped forward to add our names to the clusters we were eager to work on personally. It was an inspirational and moving morning. At the next day's Church Council, Amy asked the Council to approve making the Community Connections Steering Committee a regular part of the church structure. It will function like our Mission and Outreach group used to but go further, as we pursue this new way of connecting to our community. The Council approved this change, and members were invited to join the committee . You are invited too!
