Approaching the Manger

Now concerning love of the brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anyone write to you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love one another; and indeed you do love all the brothers and sisters throughout

Macedonia. But we urge you, beloved, to do so more and more.

1 Thess. 4:9-10

And we're here. We wrapped up worship for the second Sunday in Advent yesterday, recalling and reclaiming the voice of the one crying out in the wilderness to, "Prepare ye the way of the Lord and make straight his paths!" Some Sunday school classes are working on Christmas projects — sorting letters to our homebound members (because we love you very much), or gathering goods for Christmas families in need. Our Compassion Market, last weekend, empowered artisans from our neighboring Binghampton community. Our Tiny Pantry is full (and empty, and full, and empty), as we place food in it and continue to encourage the Evergreen Historic District to join us. We're feeding people. We're meeting people. We're loving people.

We have prepared our hearts to come to the manger...again.

Why do we do this every year? Sometimes the pomp and circumstance of it all is lost on us regular Sunday attendees. We know the story. Jesus parents were on the way to register themselves with the census in Bethlehem when they needed a place to stay overnight. There was no room in the inn. They stayed out back in what we've always called a stable but was more likely a cave with a feeding trough and a manger. There, with no midwife and no epidural, Mary birthed Jesus — the Messiah — the Son of God — God incarnate, and the story begins again. We move quickly from there to wise men, Jesus in the temple, water-to-wine, Lent, the Last Supper, and BOOM — Easter again.

We know the story. We know what it's all about. We 'keep Christ in Christmas.' It's what we do. Why do we come back to the manger every year? Why is this story on eternal repeat? What happened, happened and yet we act like it's happening again for the very first time, every single December.

I'm drawn to this verse from 1 Thessalonians 4. These words from Paul petition the churches in Macedonia to continue to love one another as God has taught them in Christ Jesus. I love most, however, the way it ends: "But we urge you, beloved, to do so more and more."

Since January we've met continually as a church to discuss all of our next steps and the question has come up. We already feed people. Why add another feeding program? We already love people. Why are we talking about being more inclusive? We already house homeless people. We already have a clothes closet. We already engage our neighbors. We always say, "Yes!" Why are we talking about adding? Why are we talking about doing more?

Every December we come to the manger again to meet God — wrapped in swaddling clothing — small and helpless. We know the story. He will grow up. He will teach those who follow him. He will save us from ourselves that we might be one with God but also...

...that we might, "do so more and more."

Jesus said that we'll always have the poor with us, and we do. Jesus' ministry to the lepers, to the Gentiles, to the tax collectors, and to the blind are a message to us about those who are sick and marginalized. Jesus' continual rebuke of "the way it's always been" and the systems of this world that would put money-changer's tables in the temple, echo through time to now — before the manger again — calling us to remember what it meant that God chose to come into this world — that we might know love and so that we might do so [love] more and more.

Coming to the manger every year is so that we might again claim the mission of God who came to us that we might know love and that we might love, always, more.
