Yesterday's Palms...

"I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you; therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes." — Job 42:5-6

They've been high atop a shelf in my

office, laying on top of the pan in which they will burn — the same pan the palms burned in last year. I've watched them all year long, periodically thinking of their story and, in many ways, counting down the months until they, like the Phoenix in Greek mythology, will completely die and take on new life.

The children paraded in with them last Palm Sunday. They danced around, twirling in circles. I had to remind several of them, primarily my own, that the palms are not, in fact, light sabers. They made a mess with them, spreading them along the floor in front of the communion table and just within reach of the quilt that we put down for the children's message. More than one child was disappointed to leave the palm branches, understanding that they had much more interesting possibilities — more interesting than Lenten decor.

And then I gathered them after worship and brought them to my office until Maundy Thursday when I took a good number of them, only slightly wilted, and placed them on the communion table reminding us of that Palm Sunday celebration — of the joy of the people who lined the streets in Jerusalem — the children singing, "Hosanna! Hosanna! Blessed is the One who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna!" They were joy-filled and poised to receive their king — their Prince of Peace. And it was important to remember that celebration as Jesus said those words on Maundy Thursday, "Love and serve one another. Do this in remembrance of me," — these words the night before hosannas turned into, "Crucify him!"

Good Friday. Holy Saturday. Easter Sunday.

Then, they sat. They've been there on the top of the bookshelves all year. It's really the safest place they could be. Things get moved around a lot in the church and especially so in the last year as we "right-sized," and have had to make room for things. They've been where they won't get lost — where I won't lose them (let's be honest). They've been slowly but surely losing their life-force and preparing for the next great thing.

In two weeks I'll take the palms down and go outside to patiently burn them. It's sort of a sad thing. What's left of the green will turn to black and gray. The smell of an ashy death will be pretty apparent in my office. I'll mix them together and crunch what didn't fully burn. In the end I'll mix them with a little bit of oil and the ashes will look a bit more like a black paste.

On Wednesday, you will come in to mark the beginning of the season of Lent — a season marked by personal wildernesses and self-examination — where bad habits will no longer linger as we deal with the nitty gritty — as we welcome a cleansing — as we reclaim, "Hosannah," and prepare for the coming of the Lord — the reign of Christ apparent in our lives — something that, at times, like the life-force in the palms, slowly and surely *seems* to leave us.

It's really amazing what the palms go through. They pull us into a beautiful and joy-filled celebration and then they wither and die a painful sort of death to prepare us for a time when we are to face our humanity and handle the blemishes and struggles, so that when Easter comes, the death of the palms (the claiming of our humanness) — the relinquishing of our sin — might usher us into new life, life abundant, and resurrection hope.

But first Lent. First we prepare to, over the course of 40 days, let things die. Maybe it'll be sad, like watching the life leave something we once thought was beautiful. Maybe it'll hurt, like a fire that burns to destroy rather than refine. Maybe we'll fight it. Maybe we'll welcome it. Just remember, like the palms, this season is preparing us for the next great thing.

but our men guests are the best. They are easy going and just easy to hang around with – no drama. Many thanks to our friends at St. Stephens United Methodist Church, including Rev Deb, Alice, and Ric, for providing a wonderful homecooked meal. Our guests loved the big green salad, baked chicken, green beans and enormous baked potatoes with all the fixin's. For dessert they served homemade banana pudding and two different cakes. The men loved the giant, perfectly-cooked potatoes. I don't think it is something they eat very often

Special thanks to Ila and Kudzai for spending the night so the men could be out of the rain for the night.

I forgot to show you the attached photo last week. I pulled this dress out of the laundry hamper we put out for guests to trade in clothes they don't need. I've seen things like this before from our women guests. This is a totally impractical piece of clothing for someone without a home, but it has several gauzy layers of beautiful material, and it was well cared for. Most women and some men have a favorite piece of clothing. In the case of women, we will hold onto that favorite dress, blouse, perfect jeans, whatever for many years even if it no longer fits. It represents a time when something was



exactly as we wanted it to be. Mine is a light-weight gauzy white shirt that I probably will never fit in again, but I'm keeping it just in case. I think one of our guests finally had to let go of this green dress. When you have to keep everything you own in a backpack and maybe one other bag, this dress takes up too much room. Let's not forget that our guests have lost more than a warm place to sleep at night. In many cases they have lost almost every precious possession tied to good memories.

Trinity Trivial Pursuit?

How would you like to play Trinity Trivial Pursuit? Are you ready? Let's go!

<u>Question #1</u>: How many people does it take EVERY SUNDAY in the Children's Department to man/woman the Children's Sunday School Class, the Nursery, the Card Factory, and the Children's Table in Worship?

Answer to Question #1: At the very least, it takes five adults. There are actually nine "slots" that must be filled every Sunday: two in Sunday school, four in the Nursery (both Sunday school and Worship hour), two in the Card Factory (Worship hour), and one at the Children's Table in Worship. Some of our adult members fill more than one slot on a given Sunday; technically, the number on any Sunday could be as many as nine individuals who serve in one of these capacities. Our Safe Sanctuary policy, which was adopted for the protection of our children, youth, and vulnerable adults, requires that a minimum of two adults be present for every ministry with children. During the worship hour, guess what! There is one adult in charge, and everyone else in the congregation is the second adult, especially if there is no other adult at the Children's Table.

<u>Question #2</u>: How many slots need to be filled in the Nursery right now?

Answer to Question #2: Four slots are currently open. The 1st Sunday's Worship time, the 2nd Sunday's Worship time, the 3rd Sunday's Sunday school time, and the 5th Sunday's Sunday school time.

<u>Question #3</u>: Where do you see yourself serving in Sunday's Children's Ministries?

Answer to Question #3: Of course, this is not a trivial issue. It is a vital one, in terms of our faithfully answering God's call - His commission to each and every one of us - to raise our children in the faith. To volunteer your services as a nursery helper, contact Sue Taylor, who is our Nursery Coordinator. To serve in any other area of Children's Ministries, see Alyson Foreman or Irene Dycus.
