Lent, the Wilderness, and What I'm Surrendering

"And why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labor or spin. Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor

was dressed like one of these. If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? So do not worry, saying, What shall we eat?' or What shall we drink?' or What shall we wear?' For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. Therefore, do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own."

Matthew 6:28-34

When I was a teenager, this was easier. It was fun, and cute, and simple. I'm going to give up chocolate for Lent. And, as much as I enjoyed chocolate, that was a breeze. I didn't eat chocolate every day. I wasn't consistently faced with the temptation to eat it. And by the time Easter rolled around, I'd have accrued a pretty nice collection of Cadbury Eggs and then had the freedom to "go at it." It was simple, as a teen.

But it didn't take too long for me to realize that I didn't feel any different when I gave up chocolate for Lent. Even as a young person, I knew that this sacrifice – this surrendering – was supposed to make me feel like I was closer to God or like God was more present in the way that I lived my life. And that's what this is about. This season is about entering into a wilderness place – a place where we have surrendered – a place where we allow Jesus to proverbially 'take the wheel,' and watch as our life evolves into something new – something of a chrysalis experience. In Lent we endure the pain that is surrendering and change, with great anticipation of something new on the other side of it all.

You've read before, time and again (actually), of my confession that I am someone who struggles with anxiety. Anxiety is much more than worry, however, embracing worry sure does enhance anxiety. And that's not an amazing place to be as someone who is bound to the covenant of itineracy. It's also that season – the one where Josh and I twiddle our thumbs wondering if the phone will ring and we'll need to drag down the

quite impressive collection of Amazon Prime boxes from the attic to begin packing – our chrysalis – knowing that it's time for our hearts to change and every facet of our lives along with it. It's not for the faint of heart; nor is it the most amazing place for the anxiety-ridden pastormom.

I can't control these things – this life that I'm fully committed to. I can't. I have a little say, and I can adequately express the hopes and desires of my heart, but this – this whole life change – is far out of the realm of my control, and this same story is read every Spring.

For Lent, I wonder what it might be like, not to surrender the anxiety, but to surrender the myth that I could ever have control – to surrender the desires of my heart. And maybe even surrender the small moments of control that I seemingly have, from the day my children have at school (how they're treated, how well they do), to how the chairs are arranged in the Worship Center. I wonder how hard it might be, and on the other side, how freeing it might be – how open and receptive I might be to the will of God if I stop trying so hard to insert my own will in every little facet of the day. I wonder how this practice might benefit my relationship with the Redeemer since this is the point of surrendering in Lent.

Maybe you'll join me in this practice. I won't lie; I think this is a universal struggle and that it would benefit the whole if we'd covenant to let go together. Maybe you see a greater place of surrender that's necessary in your life for this season. Whatever it is, I covenant to walk alongside you in your Lenten journey, and pray that you'll walk with me as well.

New type of Coordination: flexible hospitality

Room in the Inn for 2019-2020 is winding down. We have five sessions left for this winter season. Since I am leaving the coordinator role at the end of March, we are trying to figure out a good way to keep this ministry going. Finding someone who wants to take on the full coordinator role is difficult, but finding individuals who are willing to be team captains for specific volunteer roles might be the better way to go. We have a few people who are willing to act as captains. Those captains would stay in touch with all the people who volunteer in their same role and make sure that volunteer duty is covered each week. The program would still need someone to send weekly emails to make sure everyone is on the same page – sort of a communications coordinator. Flexible hospitality

Over the past seven years, we have learned that sometimes we have to be flexible to make sure we can provide the best service for our guests. We used to take both men and women guests for each session, but we never knew how many of each group we would have until about 5:15 p.m. on Tuesday nights. That meant we often had to move beds around to different rooms at the last minute to have the correct number of beds for each gender. Sometimes at the last minute we have been told we have a family coming, so our volunteers start moving beds and setting up an area just for that family.

A few times we have had national elections on Room in the Inn nights. A couple of times we had to cancel a November session for a big election. Once when we still had a big room upstairs with tables, we had the dinner upstairs, since the fellowship hall is the polling place, and it is open until 7 p.m.

A week ago we realized that Super Tuesday (the national primary election) would coincide with our RITI session. We did not want to cancel and leave 13 guests without a bed for the night. For serving dinner, we decided we could use two rooms upstairs that have some tables in them – the youth room and the Sunday school room across the hall. It won't be that same dining experience where everyone is together in the same room, but it will allow us offer overnight hospitality to 13 guests who would otherwise be outside for the night. My guess is that we will have "fun" trying to navigate the hallways with all the extra voters lined up.

It will be worth it in the morning when several guests tell us they slept well and feel better.
