From Bible-Thumper to Beautiful Feet

I'm going to admit something embarrassing in this writing. It's something I'm not sure I've ever mentioned. When I was a teenager, I was in a band. You are more than welcome to laugh. I was in a youth praise band at my church. I mostly sang lead vocals and strummed a little clumsily on my guitar (not unlike today). We had another, much better, guitar player as well (think Marc Taylor). We had a bassist (my friend Erin), and a djembé drummer (Hillary), and a full-set drummer (Kathryn), and occasionally others. The youth ministry interns at my church (students from Lambuth) helped us assemble and often played alongside us. It was really very fun, and every week, we led youth

worship during the time our youth group met.

When we founded the band, we weren't sure what we'd call ourselves. Being a very young, very skilled little Bible-thumper, I turned to scripture. It wasn't too hard to find verses about praise. The Psalms are steeped with them. It was a little harder to find verses about exhortation. Finally, after a good bit of reading, I stumbled upon the very best thing and a verse that, since the day I discovered it, has been my favorite: Romans 10:15.

In the beginning of the 10th chapter of Romans, Paul is sharing the Gospel news that salvation is a gift offered to all Creation, and he is drawing very distinct lines about confessing Jesus but not living Jesus. In the end, the Word is good (as it tends to be), but he doesn't stop there. In the next little bit (where my favorite verse is), Paul points out a problem in both an instructive and constructive way. He says, "But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

Beautiful Feet. That's who we would be. The fulfillment of this text is who we believed ourselves to be for the church, for the youth, and for anyone who might darken the doors. At the same time, our being God's Beautiful Feet was with the intent that anyone who'd hear what we had to offer, would then, too, become beautiful feet.

And that is the church. A body of people who gather to receive the Good News of God's salvation for all people, who then offer that to others.

Trinity, we have a mission. Not only does Paul remind us that professing Jesus means very little if we are not living Jesus, but he also reminds us that we have a collective responsibility to offer Jesus to the world. That only **begins** on Sunday morning. That invitation — to know God, know God's love, and find a home in a Savior — it doesn't live at the church. It has to leave the church and live in the world.

I've been thinking a bit (or a lot) about church growth and decline lately, specifically our own, and I wonder...where are the beautiful feet? A church cannot grow if the invitation stays there Sunday when we leave at noon. The Good News of God's work at 1738 Galloway needs beautiful feet to share an invitation with others. It requires an invitation to friends, neighbors, strangers. When was the last time you invited someone to church? It very really can be as easy as hitting a share button on your computer screen or as meaningful as a conversation across your lawn. It might mean a phone call to someone you think needs community (and a follow-up phone call, and maybe a second follow-up phone call).

The Kingdom of God wasn't meant to grow in some small terrarium on a shelf. Is the Bible Real?

The **FAITH WORD** for the current study in our Children's Sunday School Class is **BELIEVE: to know in your heart what is true about God and faith.** Last Sunday, during the video about the story of Jesus' baptism in Mark 1:4-11, the child host in the video mentioned something about the Bible. Eli, our five-year-old, asked Ms. Alyson, "Is that real?" His question was really, "Is the Bible real?" Ms. Alyson then

had a golden opportunity to witness to this precious child about how very real the Bible is and how its stories can guide our lives.

A letter to parents at the back of the **CELEBRATE WONDER BIBLE STORYBOOK** reminds us that "wonder is the way children engage with the world. Children are constantly wondering...Through curiosity and exploration, children demonstrate their faith and their spirituality...When children are given the opportunity to wonder about our faith stories, they can begin to make meaning and make its stories part of their lives."

Is that Book real? Is the Bible real? Our children read these stories in our Bible storybook, and they may wonder and find awe in them. But what makes this Book, this Bible, this God, this Jesus, this Spirit real to them is when they see us live into those stories in our lives as God's family at Trinity Church.

This coming Sunday's story is "Jesus Feeds the Five Thousand," which is found in John 6:1-14. This is the only one of Jesus' miracles that is recorded in all four Gospels. In the Book of John, the miraculous feeding of thousands – five thousand men <u>plus</u> women and children – begins with a young boy's offer to share his lunch of five loaves of bread and two fish. While the disciples are overwhelmed by the challenge of feeding all those people, Jesus is miraculously able to use the boy's gift, small as it is, to provide for everyone. And there are twelve baskets filled with fragments of barley loaves after all have eaten.

How about you and me? Do we think our gifts are too small to make a difference? We may not have enough to feed all the hungry neighbors in Memphis. But when each one of us gives what he or she can to the two food pantries we support – and does it regularly - our collective gifts can make a difference in the lives of many

people. When we act together as the body of Christ, when we demonstrate our love for God through our love for our neighbor, our children will witness our actions. And then they can truly see and believe that this book that we call the Holy Bible is real.





Safe Sanctuaries Creating a safer environment for children, youth & vulnerable adults

Safe Sanctuaries

After a long hiatus due to the COVID pandemic, we find ourselves ready to resume stricter observance of Safe Sanctuaries. In-person children's Sunday school is back in full swing, our youth group is again active, and we are able to visit our homebound members and friends once more. All Trinity UMC members and attenders who are involved with children or vulnerable adults are required to adhere to the guidelines detailed in our Safe Sanctuaries Policies and Procedures Manual. A copy of the most recent version of those policies and procedures can be found on our website under the "ABOUT" tab. Scroll down to the bottom of the page (which includes our Mission and Vision Statements) to the button marked "SAFE SANCTUARY POLICY." That link will take you to the full document.

In order to be in full compliance with Safe Sanctuaries, all volunteers working with children or vulnerable adults must be fingerprinted and have online background checks run. The church will cover the cost of the fingerprinting. Our administrative officer, Debby Marston, will run the online checks. All you will need to do is sign appropriate release forms and register for fingerprinting by an approved Tennessee Bureau of Investigation (TBI) contractor. Fingerprinting is digital and results will be sent to the church office electronically once your clearance goes through. We know that, in rare cases, an individual's fingerprints do not register on the digital scanner. In those cases, the TBI can provide a clearance by a name search. All background checks are completely confidential and results are kept locked in the church safe. If you work with children, youth, or vulnerable adults, don't delay. Contact the office to start the process.


