The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined.

— Isaiah 9:2

It's time. Some years it sneaks up on me. This year, it didn't. I've been waiting, hopefully, with joy, lovingly and excitedly impatient for the peace that comes with this season — this holy and beautiful season marked by the contrast of light and dark, of shortened days, the

smell of neighborhood fire pits in the air, and the holly-jolly goodness of humanity just itching to come on the scene. It's Advent. It's here.

And yet...

It's not yet — the Light in the darkness, that is. That's what Advent really is. It's this whole process of, again, entering into the realization that the miracles that happened so long ago and their effects still bring the Light into our darkness today. That, I find, is a miracle itself. We don't rush to the manger, though. It's a journey — a process.

As I look around the parsonage I am overwhelmed by distractions of my own making. I refuse to admit how many Christmas trees go up in this place. Ceramic. Flocked. Tiny (in the kid's rooms). Aluminum (as an homage to my love for all things midcentury-modern). The 'main tree' in the living room, tells stories of our journey throughout the years. There are ornaments on it made in the children's Sunday school class of TUMC. But, for a week (at least), it's chaos. There are plastic bins all over and a shift in everyday ordinary things to reds and greens. Somehow, the Light gets lost in all of that.

And I think that's our challenge — to not lose the Light in this season. Losing the Light puts us in danger of losing the hope, and the love, and the joy, and the peace that is sure to come if we do all we can to not get lost in holiday parties and presents, homemade goodies, and "It's a Wonderful Life," school holiday programs, and ugly Christmas sweaters (or not-so-ugly sweaters). It is our challenge to not lose sight of the Light — the one piercing through the darkness to bring us the hope of the nations.

I wonder if you might join me in this challenge during Advent. I wonder if you might share your experience with me if you do.

I am often up before the sun comes up (to get children ready for school), and still up long after it goes down (and they as well, to bed). I wonder if you might join me in a few moments of prayer every day during Advent — and not during your regular prayer time, if you are so disciplined, but in the darkness. I wonder if our prayers together might be to see clearly the Light that dispels the darkness — to be drawn into an awareness of the hope that is the coming of our Savior — to, again, know the love of the Father who sent him — to testify to the joy that he brings us, and to feel the peace of his dwelling — Emmanuel, God with us.

Whether it be for hope, love, joy, or peace, I hope you will join me in praying this season, to keep the Light in front of us, to be the Light, that others might see his coming, and all it means, in us.

Storytelling

I'm writing this article on Thanksgiving Day. It's a rare Thanksgiving in that I have time this morning to be "Mary," to sit quietly in the Lord's presence. I have already baked two chocolate chess pies for today's family meal, and the dressing is cooking in the crockpot in my kitchen. The other members of my family are playing the role of "Martha" at Andrew's and Jessica's home today as they prepare the big feast. Because I have had a recent minor surgical procedure, I am taking it easy. This has blessed me with some time for retrospection and introspection.

Here's what has been a part of this day for my whole life long. Thanksgiving is a day on which our family shares the family stories as we're gathered around the table for the big meal. Those stories have grown in volume over the years, as we have added other loved ones through marriage and birth. I will be the oldest family member there today, so I'm the repository of many of the tales of my birth family (the Barfields), as well as the family into which I married (the Dycuses). My daughter-in-law Jessica's family (the Johnstons) will be here from Little Rock today. We will share some of our collective family stories, and our younger members will be adding their life stories and dreams to the mix. We have told some of these stories many times over the years, yet each time we rejoice in telling and hearing them told once again. Our family stories help define who we are, from the oldest to the youngest member gathered around the table. They also help our younger ones know that they are valued and loved for themselves and for their contributions to the family stories. Many of the stories we share are funny, and some bring tears to our eyes. They are all part of our legacy.

We do the same as a faith family here at Trinity Church. A couple of weeks ago, two of the devotions written by Keller Hawkins in *The Upper Room Disciplines* focused on the importance of storytelling at our faith family gatherings. In the devotion based on Joshua 24:1-3a, 14-15, Hawkins said:

Storytelling helps us remember who we are, where we've come from, who came before us. From this sacred act of remembering our stories, we are also invited to envision together who we want to become. This expands as we recall and retell our story with God and God's abiding relationship with us and our people. We are anchored in our divine relationship and moored by God's continued grace and love.

In another devotion based on Psalm 78:1-4, Hawkins shared these profound thoughts:

We must learn from the past so we can imagine our future with hope. I am prompted here to remember the importance of the children in the next generation. They carry on the stories of who we were. And they have the precious option of living into the legacies of the past or changing the direction of the story. Are we teaching them well about where they have come from so they can step into the future with courage and faith? How are we doing this truthfully and completely? What is left out, and why? How might that affect those to come?

These are challenging words for those of us who are teachers of the children of our church to consider, indeed for our entire church family, for we all serve as role models for our children. The following combines the prayers from those two days' devotions:

"Dear God, may we always remember that you are the author of our story. Embolden us to serve you well. May we face our past with courage, remember your wondrous works, and live into our future with our eyes set on you. Amen."
