It's that week. You know the one I'm talking about. It's the week thousands of shoppers will run to whichever retail establishment to buy last minute gifts. It's the week folks will dash in whichever grocery store they use to grab a ham or dinner rolls. Don't forget the cranberry sauce — in a can — the jelly kind (just what God intended). Some folks will

put up their trees. Others (like me) will finally settle down and wrap a few things. We'll squeeze in some time to watch It's a Wonderful Life, or a Miracle on 34th Street. Maybe you prefer a Christmas Story or Christmas Vacation. It's the week, though — the week we've been waiting for.

Or maybe you haven't.

In my time at Trinity, we've not had a Blue Christmas or Longest Night service. I'm honestly not sure why we haven't. We need it, especially on this side of covid, because Christmas can be hard. The pastor will stand in the pulpit for weeks encouraging listeners to prepare their hearts for the coming of the Prince of Peace, realizing that some (perhaps you) don't feel peace at all. First, second, or tenth Christmases without loved ones can be hard. Our happy memories of sharing the Christmas week happenings with them, seem to melt into puddles of sorrow at their loss and perhaps regret. It can be a *ghost of Christmas past* sort of feeling — one where we look back in joy and hope until we remember that we are not in the past, but in the present instead; and the present reality isn't at all like that of the past.

It is my 8th Christmas without my mother and I look back and feel all of those things. I wish she were here. I regret many of the things I said or thought in the end. I miss the way she doted on Cooper and I regret that she never knew Aiden, who seems to be her twin in so many ways. I feel all of these things at Christmas so much more than I do any other time of year, and I imagine that you do, too. Whether it was this year or ten years ago, for some reason, at Christmas, it feels like yesterday and the holiday that brings us both home and to the manger, often brings sorrow instead of joy.

And I want you to know this: It's ok. I'm not writing today to put some bandaid on pain that feels inevitable and unstoppable. There is no trite saying that will change the reality that pain is as it is. There is no way of turning back, of fixing what was broken, healing what was ill or hurt — there is no changing the circumstance. I will not tell you to choose joy, because sometimes you simply can't. I will only tell you that how you feel is okay. It doesn't make you any less faithful. It doesn't mean that you don't accept God's peace. It simply means that you are human — that we are human — and that no one understands that better than the one who made us in their image.

If you are feeling down this week, please know that you are not alone. As we proclaimed together Sunday, we live in God's world. In life, in death, in life beyond death, we are not alone. Thanks be to God.

- Juice






- Fruit (1 apple/orange/pear & 1 applesauce or fruit cup)

"Lord, prepare me..."



"Lord, prepare me to be a sanctuary, pure and holy, tried and true. With thanksgiving, I'll be a living sanctuary for you." ("Sanctuary," THE FAITH WE SING #2164)

Our Children's Sunday School Class sings these words each week, as Ms. Alyson leads them so beautifully. My grandchildren have been attending Sunday School lately. They are invited by me personally every week, and I am thrilled

when they accept the invitation. Lila comes fairly often, and Nora has been coming on occasion. Both were there yesterday, and they came home with me afterwards. Before we ate lunch, Lila started singing "Sanctuary" as a blessing, and then Nora joined in. In fact, they sang this song throughout the meal. Forgive us, Emily Post, and thank you, Lord. That may not be good manners, but I consider it to be good faith-building, especially when it's just the three of us together. I rejoice in the many things my grandchildren are learning under the tutelage of Ms. Alyson as their Sunday School teacher, even if they are not always theologically accurate in how they express this learning afterwards. If they get God and Jesus in it, it's an opening into their hearts, a teachable moment when He can prepare them to be a sanctuary for Him, and that's good enough for me. It presents an opportunity for me to follow up with them and to discuss matters of faith in a friendly, casual manner.

Here are a few more vignettes from this past Sunday's class with our children. Our Sunday School class is a delightful mix of kids, ages 5 through 11. Oh, my, what a huge difference there is between our two kindergarten kids, Nora and Eli, and our single fifth grader, Cooper! (Our youngest ones are the same age Cooper was when he started out with us, when Pastor Sara and her family first joined us.) By the way, our curriculum is written for a one-room class which could possibly range from ages three to twelve. Carson, who started out with us as an unbelievably calm and attentive three-year-old, is now in the third grade (and is still unbelievably calm and attentive). All our grade schoolers, from second to fifth graders, are good readers, and they are also learning to read these significant Bible stories with feeling. Aiden was reading a passage this past Sunday when he came to the end of a sentence; when he got to the last word, which was followed by an exclamation point, he said the word with such emotional force that we all almost jumped out of our seats. Of course, that was great fun for our kindergarteners, who were already jumping out of their seats without any provocation. These two young ones were eventually sitting with me, one in my lap (Nora) and one beside me (Eli), and we were carrying on what could best be described as side conversations in the midst of the lesson. (Yes, Ms. Alyson, I did hear the reference to "friends who are talking out loud during the lesson." They tried to whisper, but because I'm so deaf, they had to project their voices and aim them very directly at/in my ear.) At one point, Eli looked up at me guite seriously and said about Nora, "When I'm six, she'll be six and a half." That had nothing to do with the lesson, but it was important to him. Both these kindergarteners were able to identify sight words that they knew in the items in large print that Ms. Alyson held up, our scripture and Faith Word for this unit. We take each of these children and celebrate them where they are, and then we do our best to move them to where they need to be. Our older kids are extremely patient with our younger ones and with us as teachers as we try to challenge all of them. As we were leaving the classroom this Sunday, Nora noticed the Shema on a poster on the door to the

hallway. She knew several of the words and sounded the others out quite well, with a little help from Ms. Alyson and me. That included the word "Deuteronomy." Ms. Alyson also helped my two girls read John 3:16 on the poster in the hallway and then talked to them about its significance, another teachable, reachable moment in the hands (and heart) of an excellent teacher and faith-model for our children.


Winter Weather

We don't often publish something brought to our attention by our insurance agents, Martin & Zerfoss, but a recent e-mail had some good tips about protecting our homes and our church property from frozen pipes, so we're including those tidbits for your information and hope you'll find them helpful.

With extremely cold temperatures in the forecast, it is important to know how to protect your home from frozen pipes, which could lead to very costly repairs.

- Repair and seal cracks around windows and doors that can allow cold air to reach indoors.
- **Know** the location of the shut-off valve for your water supply.
- Seal around pipe openings to prevent cold airflow.
- **Keep** the thermostat above 55 degrees even when traveling.
- Remove, drain and store outdoor hoses and close inside valves that supply outdoor lines.
- Open kitchen and bathroom cabinet doors to give indoor plumbing access to warmer air.
- Allow faucets to drip.
- **Open** outside valves during winter months, so that remaining water can expand without breaking pipes.
- Monitor water-based fire protection systems.
- It's important to take care of these preventative measures now, in order to stave off any water damage due to freezing temperatures.
