## What is a Reconciling Church?


As Trinity enters into our discussion of how we can live out our mission to proclaim God's word by building community and by living by the example and teachings of Jesus Christ, some of us will propose that Trinity become a Reconciling Church. The Nowlin Class has already become a Reconciling Group, as have our partners at Binghampton United Methodist Mission. Perhaps it will be helpful to say here what a Reconciling Church is.

The Reconciling movement grew up in 1984 in the United Methodist Church. This is their statement of who they are: "We work to advance justice and inclusion for all LGBTQ people in The United Methodist Church and beyond. Reconciling ministries are churches, Sunday school classes, youth groups, regional groups, campus ministries, colleges, and more that have made the Reconciling commitment to intersectional LGBTQ justice."

My little home church in Raleigh, NC is Avent Ferry UMC. They became a Reconciling Church several years ago. Here's their statement, featured on their website: Avent Ferry United Methodist Church is a Christ centered community of faith that is committed to reaching out to and embracing all individuals. With open hearts, open minds, and open doors, we are making intentional efforts toward celebrating diversity and being genuinely welcoming and inclusive of all individuals. As a Reconciling United Methodist Church, we follow Jesus Christ by loving and accepting: All Ages, All Races, All Abilities, All Cultures, All Ethnicities, All National Origins, All Education Levels, All Gender Identities, All Sexual Orientations, All Socio-Economic Statuses, All Family or Marital Statuses.

To me, the above statements are in line with Trinity's Mission Statement. I hope that as we approach our discussions, this information will help other members consider what our next steps will be.

#### God's Power Made Perfect in Our Weakness

In less than a month, my devotions from both *The Upper Room* and *The Upper Room Disciplines* have focused multiple times on God's call. These have included Jeremiah's call and commission, Samuel's call, Isaiah's call, Jesus' calling of his first disciples, and, of course, the many ways God calls each of us and the multiple ministries to which He may call us.

During this same time, I have been experiencing loss. Specifically, I'm referring to one of the greatest losses in my life, the death of my sister. Before her death, there was an eight-month-long decline in which her beautiful mind and wonderful memory wasted away along with her physical health.

I have been unable to go through this painful experience without thinking about my own life and the continuing losses of strengths and abilities that I once took for granted. My hearing loss is obvious to all who know me. I retired from teaching preschool at age 62 because, even with hearing aids, I could no longer hear the children without their having to repeat things over and over again.

However, I always remember the beautiful thing that happened after this. While I was grieving the loss of an ability that I considered essential to my teaching children in any capacity, Elizabeth Hopper invited me to be the Storyteller at Vacation Bible School. A delightful new area of ministry with children opened to me, one that I loved doing for several years. I felt that God had closed a door but opened a window for me. During that time, I also became assistant to Ms. Alyson in Sunday School. The few times she had to be absent during the years we taught together in the Children's Sunday School Class, I was able to sub, provided another hearing adult was present who could "translate" for me.

During the pandemic, as Ms. Alyson and I have continued our teaching partnership on Zoom, I have faced a new challenge in that I often lose my voice. I never know when it's going to happen. It may be for the whole Sunday school time or just a part of it; it can happen right in the middle of a sentence. I have discovered that as difficult as hearing loss may be, the challenge of not having a voice is an even greater one for a teacher. But our children, thank goodness, are very patient with me. It does mean, however, that subbing for Alyson is something I can no longer do.

Over the years, a fragment of memorized schoolwork from my high school years has come repeatedly to my mind: "They also serve who only stand and wait." These words came from the seventeenth century English poet John Milton's sonnet, "On His Blindness," in which he reflected that he had a place in God's world despite his losing his sight. Milton is best known for *Paradise Lost*, the epic work he dictated after he was blind. Those words have ever greater meaning for me as I age and as I lose ground in terms of my general health. In fact, I feel that God has also used those words to call me into an entirely different area of ministry.

Having been a caregiver to more than one loved one as their lives have drawn to a close, I know how lonely and painful this role can be. One of the things I have started doing in the last several years is to text scriptures and prayers to friends and family who are facing major health issues or who are caregivers to loved ones who are battling those problems.

I usually do this during my devotion time in the morning. I find that this also helps me focus on God and to express my appreciation to Him for all that is good in my life. I don't have to hear and don't have to talk to do this. I just need to be quiet and pray as I go through this process. It's another window that God has opened for me.

There will most probably come a time when, like my sister, I can only lie in my bed and wait. We would all probably hope to die in our sleep. That's what happened to my Uncle Fred. However, for most of us, death involves loss and pain. But once God opens that final door of death for us, we will walk through it to a new and eternal life. That's what my sister has done, and I look forward to doing that someday, too. In the meantime, I hope to remain open to what He calls me to do, knowing that His power is made perfect in my weakness and that He is with me through it all.


### **House Keeping**

On behalf of the church Trustees, there are a couple of reminders we'd like everyone to read.



## **Trinity Church Council Begins 2022**

With our first-ever hybrid meeting, the Church Council held a "practical visioning" session on January 9th after the Morning Worship service. There were 13 members present in person and 6 present on Zoom. In spite of some glitches with technology, we rejoiced to be together in such good number to look at the important question, "What's next for Trinity?"

We recalled our earlier visioning work, led by Amy Moritz, in which we assessed the personal and community resources available for doing God's work in this part of God's world. We looked again at our church's Vision Statement and Mission Statement. We asked ourselves what we need to do now. Here are some of the points that were raised:

- •We have physical space inside and outside on our property. How can we better use these spaces to carry out our mission?
- •How can we use our connections with other groups such as Binghampton United Methodist Mission, Evergreen Presbyterian Church, Room in the Inn, Evergreen Historic District, and the incoming Lab School of Memphis (soon to be renting the school space in our building) to carry out our mission?
- •What are the next steps in working toward becoming a Reconciling Church? How does that fit with our Vision and Mission statements?

There was a rich discussion, with many other points made, but in the end we decided that it is important to take some concrete steps, do a few things well right away, as we move along the path to letting God do a new thing here at Trinity UMC. Here are the things we will do now:

- •Start a walking group, for fellowship, exercise, and community visibility. Point person: Sara Goff. (fyi, this group began 5 days after the Council meeting, on Friday, Jan. 14 at 9 am!)
- •Renew our focus on Spiritual Formation with an online time of Centering Prayer led by Mike Potter. (This group also began the very next Sunday, and will meet each Sunday morning at 8:30. Use the Adult Sunday School link in your weekly E-News to join.)
- •Some Trinity members will participate in Binghampton UMM's weekly Thursday night Bible Study, on Zoom. Mike Potter will distribute information on how to log on.
- •Designate a committee to plan next steps for becoming a Reconciling Church. Volunteers were Sara Corum, Sara Goff, Myra Finch, Kay Jordan, Tom Wilson. Pastor Corum will convene a meeting as soon as possible.

The energy and hope alive in the room and on the Zoom screen was real. The follow-up that is already happening is real. God is at work!

We concluded with thanks to God for all of it, and with specific thanks to Josh McClurken and Pastor Sara for setting up the technology that made it possible for all of us to be together, and to Sam Goff for the lunch that kept us going.

Our next meeting will be on February 20 after Morning Worship. Remember, Church Council meetings are open to all. Come!
