Mother's Day

You can find most of the information I'm sharing in any encyclopedia or by checking out Google online. Mother's Day is observed in the United States as an annual holiday on the second Sunday in May. This year, it's on May 12th. (Only 17 shopping days left to find something awesome for the mothers in your life.) The first Mother's Day was established by a Methodist woman in 1908. (See question 9 on page 2 of our "Are you smarter than the average United Methodist?" quiz - Mother's Edition.)

Interestingly enough, the woman who started the Mother's Day tradition insisted that "Mother's" should be "a singular possessive, for each family to honor its own mother, not a plural possessive commemorating all mothers in the world." When President Woodrow Wilson in his 1914 presidential proclamation confirmed Mother's Day as an official holiday, he used that singular possessive form.

There are traditions that go along with Mother's Day celebrations, including churchgoing, family dinners, the distribution of carnations (the official Mother's Day flower), and wearing a carnation on that special day. The color of the flower depends on whether one's mother is living (pink or red) or deceased (white). Nowadays, roses are often substituted.

Mother's Day has become the most popular day of the year to dine out at a restaurant in the U.S. Americans are said to spend approximately \$2.6 billion on flowers, \$1.53 billion on pampering gifts—like spa treatments—and another \$68 million on greeting cards. The founder of the holiday objected so strongly to the rampant commercialization that she became a prominent opponent of what the holiday had become. One of her objections was the laziness implicit in the purchase of a greeting card rather than writing a personal letter. She was even arrested in 1948 for disturbing the peace while protesting the commercialization of Mother's Day and finally said that she wished she had never started the day because it became so out of control. *Wow*.

My experiences of Mother's Day during my childhood always included the wearing of a red rosebud by each child and a white rose by our mom when we went to church. Her mother died when our mom was only six years old, so she didn't have the same memories I enjoyed: a mother who doctored skinned knees and bee stings; played card games and board games with us; baked all sorts of yummy desserts; welcomed all the neighborhood kids into both the back yard and our house; hovered over us as we did our homework; and taught us how to cook and do chores to give us a sense of responsibility and worth.

Since my children are grown and live hours away, I don't normally get to see them on Mother's Day. They usually send me a card and call me that day, but we're not together. What makes the holiday a treasure are the memories that are stirred when the Mother's Day cards arrive in the mailbox. Both my kids have the same skewed sense of humor I inherited from my mom, so the cards are never sentimental. The sentiment is in the shared memories, the laughter during the obligatory phone calls, and the joy and pride I feel in being their mother. I hope you enjoy your Mother's Day memories.





Communal Living, Communal Giving

"The community of believers was one in heart and mind. None of them would say, 'This is mine!' about any of their possessions but held everything in common. The apostles continued to bear powerful witness to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and an abundance of grace was at work among them all. There were no needy persons among them." (Acts 4:32-34a)

What a powerful passage! This is how things were done in the very beginning of the Christian church in Jerusalem. The newly formed group of believers had experienced such a radical change of heart that they were of "one heart and mind" – or "one heart and soul" - resulting in a common mind uniting the church at the deepest human level. There was an abandonment of self-interest, which showed itself in outward behavior that reflected a <u>collectively transformed heart</u>. It's what we read throughout the Bible as God's desire for all his children, a heart that beats in love for Him and for our neighbor.

We studied this scripture in this past Sunday's lesson in our Children's Sunday School Class. We talked about it in relation to our Giving Contest, through which we are supporting Trinity's food pantries. We talked about how our food pantries involve our giving out of love for our neighbors who are less fortunate than we are. We give because we love. We give because we care. We give because God has greatly blessed us, and with thankful hearts we want to bless others.

Earlier this week, I came across a quote that led me immediately to another quote. Both quotes have bearing on our food pantries. In fact, both have bearing on the overall life and ministry of this church. The second quote to which I was led after reading the first was this: "In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams." This comes from Acts 2:17 and is itself a quote from the Old Testament prophet Joel.

Guess what, folks! Old Testament and New Testament quotes have become a current reality at Trinity Church. Over a year ago, Troop 13 scout Alex Landrigan surprised us when, as his proposed Eagle project, he envisioned turning a seldom-used chapel into a life-giving ministry: a food pantry at Trinity. I cited this Acts/Joel quote in a **Trinotes** article that I wrote last April about Alex's vision for a food pantry. I also wrote the following: "Carrying out this ministry will require commitment, not only from this church, but from the surrounding community in ways similar to the Room in the Inn program that we operated in the past. May God give the Trinity Church Family the passion, the wisdom, and the strength to make this vision a reality." Ever since that time, however, I have worried about how we were going to do this, thinking, "We're too small; we're too OLD!" Then I encountered this quote by Annie Downs, a Christian writer: "[God] knows we need dreams in pieces because we would be too scared of the whole puzzle." The young people provide the vision; we "old geezers" (as well as younger ones) must overcome our fears to make those dreams a reality. How do we do that? We break it down into smaller pieces that don't overwhelm us (one can at a time, one dollar at a time). We invite others to help. And we just keep going from there.

Now, here's an update on the food pantry Giving Contest. As of this past Monday, the balance on hand for the food pantry was \$531.50; that included donations specifically to the children's Giving Contest, as well as general contributions to the food pantry. In addition, 134 canned and boxed food items were placed in our Giving Contest box during the month of April. Keep up the good giving, folks!

Trinity Food Ministry News

We now have three parts to our food ministry: The Tiny Pantry on the front lawn, Food Vouchers/Kroger Cards (available when we have the money to purchase said grocery cards), and a full-sized food pantry housed in our former chapel adjacent to the main lobby.



Sue Taylor has agreed to manage the Tiny Pantry, and is now looking for bargains. That's where you, the membership and supporters of Trinity UMC, come in. If you clip coupons every week, you already have the mindset we need. When you hear of a sale of "canned" food items such as Vienna sausages, tuna, fruit cups, or the like, contact Sue or the church office. For the Tiny Pantry, we especially need cans with pop-tops or containers of fruit with peel-off films or lids. Remember: not everyone owns a can opener!

Money that has been donated specifically to fund the Tiny Pantry and the Food Pantry can be used to fill some of the empty shelves: those foodstuffs not normally donated in any quantity, such as proteins. We want to be good stewards of those monies by finding the best prices. The Food Pantry committee has people checking with Gordon's and Cash Saver about both



donations and possible purchases. If you know anyone in management at your favorite grocery store, ask that individual for support in the form of donations of staple items. If you can't handle the pick-up, we'll find someone who can.

This is a group effort, Trinitarians. The children have already led the way by launching a contest. Read what Irene Dycus has to say on page 3 of this issue of *Trinotes*. It'll inspire you to greater efforts to share the bounty with which God has blessed us.
