God's Presence

Behold, I am with you and will keep you wherever you go, and will bring you back to this land. For I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you." Genesis 28:15

The other day I was in the waiting room for a doctor's appointment. Josh was present, too. I'm still not sure if the establishment is, in fact, a place affiliated with the faith community, but the radio is always playing Christian music. Now, years ago, Christian music really

rang true for me. Listening to it was an important element of my faith life. Seminary changed that for me a bit. Seminary will do that to a person. All of a sudden, one's theology of everything changes radically, and the seemingly surface-level theology of contemporary Christian tunes isn't enough. I've always wondered if that's the growing pain of moving from being "babes of faith," who drink milk, to mature faith-goers who need meat for sustenance.

Anyway, the music was playing and I listened. The first song seemed to be about praising God in all things. The second song really seemed to edify the first. Then there was a third song — pretty much the same thing. To me they even sounded alike. Maybe it was just one really long song...

After the fourth song, I looked at Josh and said, "Just once I wish a Christian song allowed us to be confused and maybe even upset at the Divine and didn't insist on fixing it all by the end of 2.5 minutes of tunes." That seems more accurate. It feels more "right."

Sometimes things are, very really, hard and confusing — beyond our understanding — outside the realm of an immediate fix. Sometimes life feels less about cards falling into the right place and more like dominos — when one falls down, they all fall down. Sometimes hearing and knowing that God is with us isn't the comfort we need. Rationally, if God is with us and is omnipotent, the question might become, "Then why doesn't the God who loves me, and can, just fix it all?" and knowing that God is with us feels more frustrating than anything.

The world can feel very backward at times. Life can feel overwhelming. It may take much longer than 2.5 minutes, and we simply may not be able to praise God in the storm. I do not think that is a weakness of faith. I simply believe that's our humanity rearing its head. Sometimes it isn't enough to know that God is with us, and I think that's okay, because the God who made us fully human, also made us in the Creator's image. I think that God understands our questions, doubt, and frustrations. As much as God wishes to be "enough," I think that God understands that's not always the case and instead, time, space, patience, and understanding is what might see us through. Sometimes knowing that we are loved isn't all that we need, because love doesn't solve everything. Grief, fear, and anxiety are a liminal place — an in-between where, as much as we might need it, it's hard to receive peace.

And so perhaps rather than God's presence being a fix-all, maybe it's God's understanding that will see us through. At least, I know that my prayers are such that, in the liminal spaces, God understands that we are human, hurt is real, anxiety is hard, faith is even harder, and with any luck, we'll come back around. In fact, maybe that's entirely what grace is — God's presence with us in times where our humanness can't allow us to feel like it's enough...

... even though it is.

SCOUTING MEMORIES



Sunday, April 24th, was Scout Sunday at Trinity United Methodist Church. Troop 13 is celebrating its 100th birthday this year! As often happens on Scout Sunday, our church was not prepared for the huge number of scouts and family members who showed up for the service. We almost always run out of bulletins on Scout Sunday, and now that we are in the Worship Center, we don't have enough chairs out and must scurry to pull more out. What a wonderful blessing it is to be surprised, right?

My heart always fills with joy on Scout Sunday as it is flooded with wonderful memories of my being a leader in Cub Scouting here and of being a proud mother and wife of my two sons and my husband Joe during the time of their scouting experiences here. Mike Potter, Joe, and I kick-started the Cub Scout program back into action here about forty years ago, after its several years of dormancy. Thanks to the fine leaders who joined us then and others who have continued this tradition, both the Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts of Troop 13 have continued to faithfully continue this ministry all these years.

On April 24th, I looked across the room and saw a little towheaded boy, one of the youngest of the Cubs standing with his daddy, and I thought, "That's a Wofford over there." Sure enough, after the service, Andy Wofford, who was a towhead himself while a scout, came over to speak to me. His mom had been my Andrew's tee-ball coach, a time when the kids rolled around and played in the dirt as much as they threw and caught and hit the ball during that first baseball experience. What a joy it is to know that the scouting tradition continues in the families of fine men who were once "my" Cub Scouts.

Cub Scouts did not camp back then, other than at the yearly "Mom and Me" weekend at Camp Currier. Andrew and I did that together one time - and once was enough for both of us. Den meetings were wild and wooly, probably because they were scheduled so soon after school on weekdays. We started out meeting at our house, and that was quite a challenge. We soon got a room of our own in the basement of the Education Building, and I learned to do an activity that engaged their muscles and their loud voices at the very beginning of each meeting. Even after doing that, getting young boys to focus on our craft project for the day was often quite a challenge. Mike Potter started a Webelos den soon after we moved to the church, and Joe Dycus was our Cubmaster, in addition to being an assistant Scoutmaster.

We took several ten-mile hikes in the first two years; this is before we found out that the Boy Scouts didn't recommend hikes longer than five miles for Cubs. Oops! The longest ten-mile hike in terms of mental and physical stress was the time we decided to hike the Memphis Historical Trail. We had pencils and little cards with all the historic sites listed on them, so the Cubs could check each site off once we had read the historical marker there. This hike began in downtown Memphis, close to the Harahan Bridge, looped around the University of Tennessee Health Sciences area, through the nearby historic preservation area, and then back to the downtown area, finally finishing close to the bridge. After the first two miles of this endeavor, most of the boys had discarded their pencils and cards. By five miles, they all fell or sat down at every subsequent marker. It took <u>forever</u> to finish that hike. I started out as the leader; by the end, I was the stern task master behind the pack, driving them forward to the bitter end. When we finished, it was almost sunset.

There are so many memories that I can laugh at now, but that were mighty challenging back then. But we had quite a few of our boys who went on to earn their Eagle badge in Troop 13, my Patton among them. Praise God for fine leaders, for great kids, and for an outstanding scouting tradition that is entering its second century at Trinity Church!
