When I walked into the Renascent Convention Center, next to the Canon Center downtown, last Sunday afternoon for Annual Conference, I wasn't sure what to expect. That has been the story for the last 4 years. During covid we had two fully-virtual Annual Conferences. Last year we trekked to Nashville and had Annual Conference at Brentwood UMC. This wasn't new to the legacy Tennessee Conference folks, but it was new to everyone west of the Tennessee River. This year, I admit, I was surprised for conference to come to Memphis. I didn't realize there was anywhere big enough for us to gather, and I knew that some folks from the east side of the

Tennessee River may attend with a bit of fear and trepidation. Memphis can be intimidating, and it can also be dangerous, as 9 of our colleagues found out when their car windows were broken in the parking lot where we all parked downtown. Still, I wanted to offer radical hospitality.

I didn't know what to expect. I think I've come to expect the possibility of a break in. Crime is a rampant, poverty-driven issue in Memphis that only seems to be getting worse. I knew that I wanted my colleagues and cohorts in calling to experience wonderful things, and I wanted to better know folks from across the river. Any marriage comes with growing pains that only time seems to take care of, and we do not always get the time and freedom to work on our blended family of faith.

Here is my synopsis of Annual Conference. Please remember that my understanding of all that took place may be very different than that of our very faithful lay delegate, Sam Goff, or our Metro District at large delegate, Kay Jordan.

Roughly 80% of registered delegates met in person — the largest percentage since 2019. Roughly 20% joined us virtually. The conference mourned the disaffiliated churches we lost during a called annual conference session, May 22nd. One hundred sixty-two churches, which is about 18% of our conference, chose to relinquish commitments and covenant community vows with the United Methodist Church. It is estimated that another 50-or-so churches in our conference will leave the denomination in December of this year. After that, the

denomination as a whole will begin to restructure and there will be no other opportunities for churches to relinquish denominational, conference, and district relationships and commitments.

The conference continued to mourn the loss of Metro District Superintendent Dr. Autura Eason-Williams who was murdered in Memphis last July. We celebrated her life and other conference clergy who have entered the Church Triumphant since our last gathering at this year's memorial service.

The Conference Council on Finance and Administration offered its report. This is always the lengthiest of reports for the Annual Conference. We, like our surrounding conference brothers and sisters, are preparing for big financial changes that come with conference disaffiliations, and where the budget will be smaller the conference is making appropriate shifts to compensate. One of the hottest-topic changes in the budget is the minimization of allotted conference funds for various campus ministries and a shift in their covenantal relationships with partnering United Methodist congregations. This shift actually creates budgets for legacy TN Conference Wesley Foundations that are more like the budgets for Wesley Foundations on the west side of the river. Where there will be growing pains with this shift in resources, over time the hope is that there will be a benefit to partnering these campus ministries with local congregations. There were speeches for and against this move, but ultimately, CFA's budget proposal passed.

The ordination service was filled with hope as new local pastors were licensed, several candidates for ordination were commissioned as provisional elders and deacons, and several ordinands received their orders. Two of our conference's new elders were residents in ministry in the resident class I was blessed to see through to ordination. I am very proud to have been a part of their journey. Bishop Palmer preached this Service, and a joint choir from across the conference led us in song. Trinity's choir members participated, and it was glorious.

Several proposed resolutions offered by Reconciling UM's were considered for the floor of conference. The hard thing about new resolutions proposed for the General Conference is that those are not being received by the **General Conference** right now, as the United Methodist Church's Judicial Council has ruled that the upcoming 2024 General Conference is not a new gathering but is the postponed 2020 General Conference. As such, we did not elect a whole new delegation to General Conference. We did replace some of the 2020 conference delegation team due to losing members to both death and disaffiliation. In summation, the effects of covid are still making it difficult for us to function as a denomination, but the dust will eventually settle and, when it does, we will hear new resolutions and proposals and move forward with electing new bishops to office and allowing those who've served to retire. Until then, your pastor is STILL serving as a delegate to Jurisdictional Conference and an alternate delegate to the upcoming General Conference.

One thing that WAS voted on from the floor, that is a conference-level proposal as opposed to a general conference-level proposal, was the resolution entitled "Leading with Integrity" which, in summation, asks that those serving in leadership positions in the church, but planning to leave the denomination, step down from their leadership positions to allow those who intend to remain United Methodist to lead the church that will remain. Lead with integrity. You might imagine what that proposal grew out of.

We shared communion together. We remembered our baptism. We ate (and ate, and ate). We lightly debated.


My lament of conference was the lack of young people represented — both youth and young adults — and I wonder how we (the local church — Trinity) might help see a more diverse-in-age delegation in the years to come. Many current delegates are voting for things that will most affect those who aren't represented. This might be said, also, of the local church.

At the end of Annual Conference appointments were set, and I hope to serve with you, well, this 7th year. I ask that you pray for the United Methodist Church. It has been a very hard season for a church many of us love with great passion. Pray for the clergy who have stuck it out when it, very really, may have been easier to leave. Pray for the churches who remain alongside you, because at times, though wonderful (also), it is a challenge to be the people called 'Methodist.'

Coming Soon: Vacation Bible School 2023!

We are so excited to be able to offer Vacation Bible School once again to the children of Trinity Church, as well as to the children of our community. This year's VBS will be a very new and different one for Trinity UMC in several ways: new friends in ministry, new time of day, and new site! We're delighted to be partnering with our sister United Methodist Church, St. John's UMC, in an evening time VBS, which will be held at their facilities, 1207 Peabody Avenue (at the corner of Peabody and Bellevue, not far from Central High School). Our VBS week of July 17-21 is fast approaching, so parents are encouraged to register their children online soon at https://tinyurl.com/86htadv4 ! All children who are age 3 (and potty-trained) through rising 5th graders are invited to join us for this week of fun and faith-learning. Rising 6th graders and older youth are invited to be VBS helpers. Each evening's activities will begin with a kid-friendly meal for all the children from 5:30 to 6:00 p.m. The VBS program will follow, from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. daily.

The theme for this year's VBS is **Operation Restoration: Mending God's World.** Our children will make connections between Bible stories and mending actions as they discover simple ways to live out their faith in daily life. Each day at Operation Restoration will feature a theme word, a Bible story, and several activities that will help each child explore what it means to be a mender in God's world. For instance, on Day 1, the THEME will be FEED. As we explore the BIBLE STORY of Genesis 16:1-36, we will be learning about God's provision of food for the people of Israel during the forty years of their time in the wilderness until they came to the Promised Land. The MENDING ACTION is that God gives enough food for all. Fishes and Loaves Food Pantry at Binghampton UMM, 258 N. Merton St., is open on Tuesdays and Fridays from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. for distribution of fresh fruits and vegetables....people can come as often as they want for these.

Once a month, folks can request an emergency food bag (canned goods, peanut butter, cereal, rice, dried beans, soup, etc).
