## When Faith in Humanity is Lost

"I have said this to you, so that in me you may have peace. In the world you face persecution. But take courage; I have conquered the world!" — John 16:33

Sometimes I lose faith in humanity and I can get stuck in a place where it feels like there's no hope to be had. Is that you, too? Am I alone in that?

Thanks to covid, it's been awhile since I had to drop off or pick up children from school. I can't say that's something I've missed. Pick up and drop off is the bane of my existence. It's a wonder that I've ever made it to and from the school without getting hit, run over, or yelled at. I'm not sure what it is about the process of getting the kids to school that is so difficult for everyone, but I find that it really brings out the worst in humanity.

The same sort of thing happens at the Kroger on Union. You all just thought, "We should tell her to go to the one at Poplar and Highland." I know. I promise I know, but the Union Kroger is so close (and so packed at every hour of the day, with no parking spots open, no one checking out, and no spaghetti squash). It's generally a pretty difficult experience.

And have you ever tried to pick up a prescription from the Walgreens at McLean and Union? If you haven't, don't. Please heed my advice. If you want to believe there is any goodness left in this world, do not have your prescriptions sent to the Walgreens at McLean and Union. (I paused my writing here to send my husband a text massage asking HIM to pick up my prescription from the Walgreens at McLean and Union.) You will leave in tears, frustrated and under-medicated.

Also, there's a woman in my neighborhood who I want to believe has really good intentions, but steadily makes me lose my faith in humanity. If you do not hurriedly pull your garbage and recycling cans from the end of your driveway back to wherever they go, immediately after they are emptied by Waste Management, she will take it upon herself to move them to the very center of your driveway. Bless it.

Sometimes I wonder where the world is going. Humanity seems like it's a mess. It can be discouraging when every little thing that should be simple is difficult, and it's hard not to find ourselves exhausted over the amount of energy we have to exert to accomplish the basic day-to-day things. It's tough when the people around us seem to let us down, when we begin to notice that the systems under which we live are all so broken, and basic, everyday tasks, like buying groceries, or picking up prescriptions, or dropping kids off at school, are miserable experiences.

And then hope comes with the morning. There is someone who, without being asked or prompted, will do some nice thing. There will be some stranger who steps up to the plate to make a situation better. Someone will let you out to turn left onto Union leaving Kroger. Some other parent will offer you their parking spot at the school with a look of, "We're all in this together," on their face.

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You'll witness some random act of kindness, because they do still happen. Sometimes it's simply easier for us to see what's wrong, instead of what's right.

I think it's easier for people of faith to see the good in the world. I think it's pertinent for people of faith to recall that it's not really our faith in each other that's most important, so much as it is our faith in a risen Savior. Our hope isn't in the woman who moves our trash can to the middle of the driveway. It's in Jesus Christ, our Lord, and our faith in him is what compels us, as people who believe in grace abundant, to have patience with the woman who moved the cans, or Walgreens (over-run and under-staffed) when they forget to fill our prescription. Our faith in God calls us to moments where we offer grace in our inconvenience, compassion amid our frustration, and patience even if we shouldn't have to offer it.



### Peace: complete well-being...

"Happy are people who make peace, because they will be called God's children." (Matthew 5:9)

This is the memory verse from our current study in the Children's Sunday School Class. It comes from the Beatitudes, which are part of the larger passage of scripture known as the Sermon on the Mount. In the *Common English Bible*, which is the version we use in our

children's studies, the Beatitudes are presented in a series of statements that begin with the words "Happy are people..." (Other translations use the word "blessed" rather than "happy.") These statements can be confusing for children and adults alike because many of the people Jesus names as "happy" are not people we typically think of as experiencing happiness.

So, what does it mean that people whom we normally consider to be unfortunate are described as happy in Jesus' teachings? These teachings remind us that there is hope in all circumstances through God. Our faith word for June and the first part of July has been PEACE. In the *CEB Study Bible*, peace is defined as "complete well-being, the kind that results from right relations with God and with fellow human beings." Peacemakers nurture peace, even where there are broken relationships and hostile circumstances. For our purposes in the children's study, peace has two dimensions. The first shows itself externally in our lives: "living together in harmony without fighting." The second is internal: "to be calm and know God's presence."

Our children are beginning to understand peace. They know personally what it feels like to be hurt, to disagree with a friend, and to be angry. They are also beginning to know what it feels like to make up with friends and to get over their anger. They are learning that we are not always happy, but we can still spread God's peace. We are called "God's children" because we work for peace, just as God does and just as He calls us to do, and it is in doing this that we experience true joy and happiness.

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The Children's Sunday School Class would like to express our appreciation to the Trinity Church Family for your generous support of our Can Drive, benefiting the Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry of our partners in ministry at Binghampton United Methodist Mission. While our food drive is technically over, our children faithfully support this vital ministry throughout the year by donating food items weekly. As you come to worship services during the summer, we encourage you to continue to bring canned and boxed food items for both the B.U.M.M. Food Pantry and our own Tiny Pantry at Trinity Church. In addition to providing the musical arrangement, Vera Brown (pictured) was one of ten recipients of the All Festival Performance Trophy.


She and Camden Barber were named Festival All Stars and NSPA was awarded the Freddie G. Excellence in Music Award for group performance.


