A Happy Anniversary

For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them. — Ephesians 2:10

About this time three years ago, I was busy unpacking boxes. There was crumbled up newspaper all over the house. Things were really a mess. I was still flying solo with two small children (who absolutely loved the mess). I was finishing eating a bunch of Debby's chocolate chip cookies, the fridge was pretty empty, as was the pantry. I didn't have a plan for where things would go. I didn't have time to make a plan. When you're an itinerate pastor, you hit the ground running. And, I did.

This week I celebrated the anniversary of my move here. I'd been pretty intimidated by the move. For all intents and purposes, it had seemed like a pretty well-thought-out appointment. One hopes it always is. But I was hesitant. I'd been burned a few times. I knew good and well that a square peg does not in fact fit in a round hole. I was afraid of a lot of things. I knew that I didn't need to be burned again.

I was pretty afraid of Memphis. Sure, I'd spent a lot of time here. My first drive on the interstate at 16 was the drive from Jackson to Memphis. We'd grown up visiting Beale St., the Zoo, and the Pink Palace. I'd spent some time over in Cordova. Wolfchase was where the Jacksonians came to do their Christmas shopping. But other than that, I didn't know Memphis well.

I remember someone hand-drawing me a wonderful map of the area, complete with banks I should and should not use, gas stations that I should and should not use, schools, places to eat, etc. I still have it. It was a profound and genuinely kind thing to do because, well, it was a comfort and I was afraid.

Memphis has a bad reputation. MLK was killed here. Crime is high. Poverty is high. Racial tension is real. Traffic is......crazy. How on earth could this be where I needed to be? Surely I wasn't qualified — wasn't ready — for this.

One of my favorite college professors liked to discuss the motifs of the bible. The barren woman motif. The haughty authority motif. My favorite: the motif of God's use of imperfect people.

Think about it. Abram and Sarai didn't trust God one bit. Sarai and Abram even lied about Sarai's identity while fulfilling the task God had given them, because they didn't think God would see them through. Then there's that little thing about Sarah laughing at God when God told her she'd have Issac. And what about Moses? Didn't he murder that Israelite before leaving Egypt? Even when Cain killed Abel, God made a nation from him. David had Uriah killed and, yet, his lineage is the most famous in history. Rahab the prostitute became a deliverer. Jonah was the king of second chances. Saul, the greatest persecutor of Christians in the history of the world, became the greatest apostle. And God chose, not a king or a prince, to bring his son into the world, but two young, unmarried teens of unimportant lineage to be the earthly parents of Jesus.

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God loves imperfect, unqualified, unready people. God uses those people in such a way that they begin to realize their potential in the building of the Kingdom of God.

My hesitations were very real when I came to Memphis. The job was big — share the Good News of the love of God in this big, scary, messy, fast, and amazing place. The reality is not that we truly are ready — that we truly are qualified. That's not it. We probably aren't on both accounts. The reality is that God loves us and loves to use us as we are to make a world of difference.

Thank you for three years. I hope you are as interested and excited as I am to see what God has for us next.


