### Flipping Tables

Then Jesus entered the temple and drove out all who were selling and buying in the temple, and he overturned the tables of the money changers and the seats of those who sold doves. He said to them, "It is written, "My house shall be called a house of prayer," but you are making it a den of robbers." — Matthew 12:12-13

Every weekday morning I walk Aiden to school. It's always

been such a blessing that the parsonage is so close. It's also a blessing that we've been a part of this neighborhood and this school as long as we have. I know all the teachers, and so coming to the school each day is very much like going to see friends.

Most mornings I spend a few minutes checking in with Coach Cole about how he's adjusting. He's the new PE teacher. Some mornings I'll check in with Mr. Reese — the new Art teacher. Every morning I chat for a few minutes with Ms. Carter ("Betsy") — the long-time Snowden music teacher and someone I consider a friend. She often gives me parenting advice (her kids are older than mine). Sometimes we just chat. Betsy has a history with the United Methodist Church and is a strong advocate for creating safe spaces for LGBT+ youth. She's also helped both my kids find their voices much sooner than I recall finding mine. I think the world of her.

This morning, as we were chatting, we talked about the worldview expectations of a pastor and how that worldview conflicts, at times, with my advocating for my kids. The worldview is often that we (pastors) are always docile, demur, and people-pleasing. The reality is that we were called, often, to works that are far less than keeping the status quo, smoothing out wrinkles, and keeping the whole content. We are called to works of justice for righteousness' sake and often, instead of gently shaking hands, we are turning over tables. In our world, that tends to work better when we REMOVE our clergy hat to "just be mom," or just be "advocate."

I admit that's difficult for me. No one wants to ripple the water. Everyone prefers peace. But our world isn't peaceful for so many who deserve it. Folks in all corners of our society sow seeds of harm and hurt and every voice pressing back against the systems that engender inequality is a necessary piece to the puzzle. My voice in wrong-doing is important.

And so is yours.


The work the Spirit of God does in us at our baptism is only the beginning of our being a part of a movement that creates positive change in our world. As beautiful as that 'sounds,' that often means work that presses back against systems of power and authority that would rather benefit from injustice. It means calling a brood of vipers what they are — a brood of vipers — knowing that vipers have serrated teeth and venom. It means flipping over tables even if your position in life is accompanied by a misnomer that you are always kind, patient, and endearing — making space for honesty, authenticity, and pointing out wrongdoing.

Sometimes that is my calling. Sometimes that is our collective calling. I promise to always make room for you to flip over tables. Know that I will flip them over with you.

# The Practice of Hospitality

Within the next few weeks, we at Trinity Church will have **three opportunities to practice gracious hospitality** with our neighbors. Two of these will be **Election Day Bake Sales**, which will take place on Thursday, October 5<sup>th</sup> and Tuesday, November 7<sup>th</sup>. Sandwiched between these two day-long affairs will be **Trunk or Treat**, which will be held on the afternoon of Sunday, October 29<sup>th</sup> in the Trinity parking lot. For all of these, we will need volunteers to provide "sweet treats" of some sort: baked goods for the two bake sales and candies for the Trunk or Treat. Savory food items are welcome for any of these three events as well.



For each Election Day sale, in addition to food items, helpers will be needed to help man the sales tables between the hours of 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. Our neighbors come looking for us on each of these election days! They are always pleased to see our tables loaded with baked goods AND to see our friendly smiles and to hear our words of welcome.

Of course, it goes without saying that a trunk of a vehicle (or the bed of a truck) is required for the Trunk or Treat affair. Halloween

decorations, games, and lots and lots of candy add to the fun for this get-together with neighborhood children. We will be encouraging folks in Cub Scout Pack 13, Boy Scout Troops 13B and 13G, the Lab School, and the EHDA to partner with us in hosting this exciting affair.

The dictionary defines "hospitality" as "the friendly and generous reception and entertainment of guests, visitors, or strangers." Gracious hospitality, especially when we consider it in the context of our faith, can take things to an even deeper level. Being gracious means showing respect, kindness, and courtesy toward others. It also encourages positive relationships and a sense of community. The reason why we as a church family do these things for our neighbors is not measured in terms of calories. It has more to do with our hearts. That's why we push ourselves to offer hospitality, even though it means we spend a lot of time on our feet, in our kitchens, and in grocery stores as we prepare for each event.

Before your eyes glaze over from all of the above, the numbers show that Trinity is in a much better financial position at this point in time than we originally thought we would be. Thanks to generous giving, a bequest from Jean Moss' estate, and increased rent from the Lab School, as well as rent from Living Word church, our total income is about \$25,000 above budget while our expenses have remained below budget by about \$15,500 thus far through July. Hopefully, this trend will continue over the next five months!

## **Tiny Pantry Still Needs Donations**

Our Tiny Pantry is still perched in place on Trinity's front lawn, and we occasionally see neighbors come by to replenish it. It's easy to forget how important the gift of a little food can be. Most of us don't miss many meals. There are, however, hungry folks who come by looking for a can of tuna or soup, or for just enough to get them by until their food stamps arrive. Those neighbors who are chronically unsheltered may not even have public aid in the form of food subsidies. Imagine going to bed hungry, not just one night, but almost every night. Remember to keep our Tiny Pantry stocked. Next time you go to the grocery store, pick up some extra food that can be eaten "as is," without cooking, like Vienna sausages, fruit cups, or tuna packets with crackers. Let's remember to take care of "the least of these."

Lakeshore is a camp and retreat center located on the shores of the Tennessee River, providing Christian hospitality, rest, and reflection for guests of all ages and backgrounds since 1948. A planning committee of four, Kay Jordan, Amelia Strickland, Melba Abraham, and Mike Potter, have started research on how best to stock our future food pantry

and equip our congregation for this important ministry. Amelia, Melba, and Mike visited the Binghampton UMM Fishes and Loaves pantry September 12th and were amazed at the volume of donations delivered by area churches and other organizations to keep BUMM's food pantry well-stocked. Michael Anderson, the pantry director, is said to have a real gift for inspiring generosity in community members and in keeping things organized. Trinity's food pantry committee is searching for inspiration on how best to invite the Memphis community and the Midtown neighborhood to join us in feeding families who lack the basics in terms of good nutrition. They will be touring other pantries in the area for ideas. In the meantime, Alex Landrigan is working toward completion of the physical space that will used for the pantry.
